

OWENS AND YUNDT ARE PROMOTED. Commercial Agent of the Wabash Goes to Denver on Next Wednesday.

WIRE RECEIVED HERE TODAY. Story Printed in Last Night's News Fully Confirmed—Good Advance for Both Men.

As outlined in last night's "News" R. W. Owens, commercial agent for the Wabash, goes to Denver as general agent in charge of both the freight and passenger departments of the Wabash.

FROM MURDER TO SIMPLE ASSAULT. Instead of Trial for Life, a Fine of \$250 Is Sufficient.

THE CASE OF MRS. GEISLER. Defendant Was Accused of Causing the Death of a Young Woman Over a Year Ago.

On March 16, 1905, the woman was charged with causing the death of a young woman named Margaret Graham. It was alleged that the latter went to Mrs. Geisler's place for "treatment" and a short time afterward died as a result of a criminal operation.

This morning, by consent of the county attorney, the woman was permitted to plead guilty to assault and battery instead of standing trial for the most grave offense.

To say the least this case is a most peculiar one in view of its termination. Mrs. Geisler's establishment, located at 235 west Third North street, is the place where the Graham woman went. There was a great deal of talk and scandal associated with the place, and when Mrs. Graham, who was only 23 years of age died, she made a dying statement to County Attorney Parley P. Christensen and Deputy Sheriff White, in which she accused Mrs. Geisler of performing the operation.
