MADE WRECK PROOF.

"The scheme of sending a message from the train while it was in motion was tried for the first time last week. and the message to the Gazette, the first one ever sent in such a manner, has proved that portion of our patent a success also. This means that tele-grams and telephone messages will in

"The patent is made to work with a wire by the side of one of the rails, by means of a third rail or by means of a wire arranged similar to a trolly wire.

"A railroad system can be equipped with this patent and the system can be made almost wreck-proof, as by means of this device trains can be stopped automatically whenever in dan-ger of colliding with another train, or whenever a bridge is out or the track is torn up in any way. Accord-ing to this device a broken rail will even cause a train to stop within a certain distance of the point of danger by cutting the current and automat-ically setting the air brakes in an ap-proaching train.
