NEW SWINDLING SCHEME.

It is Being Worked from Maine, and Catches Police.

San Francisco, Sept. 6 .-- A novel swindling scheme, evidently planned to embrace the continent, has just been brought to light. Recently the head office of Wells, Fargo & Co.'s express company in this city has received from its agents in the interior numerous leters and telegrams asking for instructions relative to the disposition of cer-tain packages of "valuable certificates" expressed from Greenville Junction, Maine, on each of which there was a . O. D. charge of \$5. In each place the chief of police or constable has received a letter signed Douglas W, Hill, chief inspector of police, Halifax, N. S., con-taining an order for the package and a tatement that it had been sent to M. D, Byrnes, an absconder. For the cap-ture of Byrnes, of whom a complete dewription was given, a reward of \$250 was offered and for the recovery of the express package on additional reward of \$200 would be paid. In several cases e police officer paid the \$8 and secured worthless package, The express agent had orders to send this to Frederick Brewster, attorney-at-law, New York, The scheme is known to have been worked with more or less success in at least a dozen California towns,

Grain Trade Sensation.

New York, Sept. 6.-The grain trade of the New York Produce Exchange has adopted the report of the special com-mittee on uniform commissions submitted on August 23, with a number of im. portant amendments. The following ra. ther sensational resolution was adopt-

"It is the sense of this meeting of the Grain Trade that the penalty for viola ion of rules 36 and 37 of the grain rules should be exputsion

The rules and the recommendation now go to the board of managers. The recommendation will probably not receive the endorsement of the managers. The rules as amended chiefly provide the following rates of commission as

minimum charges: For the sale of consigned grain, one half cent per bushel on wheat, corn, pats and feed barley. One cent per bushel on buckwheat, rye and malting

It is provided that where the consignment is handled for the account of any member or firm one of whose general partners is a member, or corporation one of whose executive officers is a member of the New York or one of these other regularly organized grain exchanges: Board of Trade, Chicago; Merchants' Exchange, St. Louis; Board of Trade, Duluth; Chamber of Commerce, Milwaukee: Chamber of merce, Minneapolls; Board of Trade, Kansas City; Chamber of Commerce, Cincinnati; Board of Trade, Detroit; Board of Trade, Peoria; Board of Trade, Indianapolis; Chamber of Commerce, Clavaland, Machanal Varian Cleveland: Merchants' Exchange, Buf-falo; Chamber of Commerce, Boston;

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
