TELLS STORY OF
EARLY DAY TRIP.Hardships Encountered on the
Way to San Bernardino in
The Early Fifties.

INDIANS WERE VERY HOSTILE.

Some Sent to Happy Hunting Grounds
For Interfering With Pilgrims
—Other Incidents.

To the Editor:

Salt Lake City, Oct. 12.—I was much interested in reading an article in the Saturday edition of the "News," headed "Mormon Pathfinders Guests of Senator Clark." This reminded me that I was something of a pioneer myself, and although not the "Old Pioneer," I think that I would come in a good second.

It was on the 12th day of December, 1853, that the writer struck the trail over the southern route to California, in company with J. and E. Reese and some 25 young men. There were also four or five families on their way to the Golden state. All went well with us until we struck the Santa Clara, in southern Utah. This happened on the first day of January, 1854. In the afternoon of that day, some 12 or 15 Indians came to our train while we were on the march. The natives were anxious to have us stop the train and donate for their particular benefit, shirts, tobacco, sugar, and many other things. The Indians were informed through our interpreter that we would go into camp soon; then their wants would be considered. However, this was not satisfactory to the Indians, who finally succeeded in getting ahead of the loose stock, which was in charge of John Y. Green and Mr. Murray, Dr. Lynch, and Mr. Atwood.

FIGHT WITH INDIANS.

This was a very favorable point to hold up a train, the road being very narrow, with thick brush and trees on one side and a high ledge of rocks on the other. However, the boys did not take much time to consider the situation. Carl Murray drew his revolver and fired, sending one of the Indians on his way to the happy hunting ground. Whether the shot proved fatal or not, we could not say, as he was immediately taken into the brush by his companions. About this time, business began to get lively. A number of Indians got on the ledge of rocks, by the roadside, and as the train passed out of the brush into the open, wounded three of our men. The wounds were made by arrows, as the Indians in those days knew but little about firearms.

ANOTHER DISPATCHED.

Within a short distance of where the trouble commenced, the train was stopped. A number of the boys armed themselves as quickly as possible, and started back with Dr. Lynch in the lead, armed with a double barreled shot gun. As an Indian was about to pull his bow string on the doctor, he let him know that he was not to be shot. The Indian, who seemed more than the Indian was looking for, and it was believed that he went to keep company with the one that Murray shot.

A FLAG OF TRUCE.

By this time it was getting a little too warm for our friends, the enemy, and they made a break for the cedars and cactuses. We were not molested after this, but two days later, when we struck the Rio Virgin, we discovered a number of Indians on the opposite side of the river, waving a white flag. The Indians were half a mile or more from the road, but we could distinctly hear, "Mormon yankee win," which our interpreter informed us signified, "Mormons very good," but we did not feel very good, and I am almost sure, if Mr. Indian had been near enough we would have given them a few shots.

PROVISIONS RUN SHORT.

About January 4 we camped on the Muddy, near where the railroad crosses that stream, and two days more brought us to the Las Vegas. The next important place was Resting Springs. At this place an inventory of our provisions on hand was taken. There was but little left besides flour, which amounted to about 2½ pounds for each individual. It was yet 200 miles to San Bernardino, and quite uncertain when our expected provisions wagon would meet us. So eleven of us concluded to strike out on foot for the land of sunshine. At the Amarosa, seven miles from Resting Springs, we took our supply of water and provisions for 11 of us, and set out across the desert 60 miles. The writer of this, Jack Wheaton, and Fred Mayhew were the first of the party to reach Bitter Springs, the rest of the boys being strung out along the road for 15 miles. About played out. Wheelock, Mayhew and the writer took what water we could conveniently carry in our hats, and started back as a relief party. We assisted all the best we could to the springs, where we laid over until night, when we all struck out for the Mojave river, 35 miles distant.

SICK AND DISCOURAGED.

When we arrived at the Mojave the following day, we were indeed sick and discouraged. Our little old 2½ pounds of water biscuit (without salt) was exhausted, after lasting us about four days. It was about 100 miles to San Bernardino, and no immediate relief in sight. The situation was indeed serious, but we took fresh courage and started up the river. After traveling about 15 miles, the expected provision wagon was in sight. Oh, joy! our hats were put into the wagon, and the very best we could give in our exhausted condition also went up. After spending the night with Starling Driggs, the teamster, a number of us went on our journey, while the provision wagon was driven on to the relief of those who had left behind.

LIVED ON MULE MEAT.

We arrived at San Bernardino on the 24th of January. The rest of our party that started with the wagon had reached the Mojave river before Mr. Driggs met them with supplies. The party had been living on mule meat for some time before the provision wagon arrived. The company all got together at San Bernardino, where we remained in camp for some time recruiting and replenishing our outfit. We then moved on to Los Angeles, San Pedro, and down the coast to San Diego, where we loaded our merchandise and this place soon after for Salt Lake, where we arrived on July 8, 1854.
