

## FOURTH ANNUAL STOCK CONVENTION.

Call Issued for Public Meeting on Saturday—Committees Appointed to Receive and Entertain 7,000 Guests.

The fourth annual convention of the National Live Stock association, commencing in this city for five days, commencing January 22nd. As set forth in the Associated Press dispatch in the "News" last evening, all the railroad companies have agreed upon a special rate to Salt Lake for the occasion, and it is not without saying that the same will be taken advantage of by not only the stockmen and their families, but by the traveling public generally.

Judging from former conventions of the association held at Denver and at Fort Worth, Tex., the occasion will be marked by the influx of some 7,500 strangers within our borders. These visitors will depart by train for their homes, but several hundred thousands of dollars worth of business will be done here in town. Stockmen will come from coast to coast and from Manitoba on the north to the Gulf of Mexico on the south with Salt Lake City as their objective point.

These pilgrims will have to be taken care of, entertained and given a good impression of the hospitality of the dwellers in the Great West. Those who have the matter in hand realize only too well the stupendousness of the undertaking and have already bestowed themselves in order to make the affair successful in every detail. In order to accomplish this end it is necessary that the work should be undertaken by the residents of this city so that the burden should not lie upon but a few shoulders. The stockmen and railroad officials in this State are working like beavers in order to accomplish this end, and are to be commended for their efforts. The fourth annual convention of the National Live Stock association will be an unqualified success in every particular.

With this end in view James C. Leary, manager of the Union Stockyards here, has issued a call for a public meeting to be held in the city on Saturday, November 17th. At a meeting of several members of the association and local railroad men which was held yesterday a number of names were suggested for the various committees by way of a start. At the general public meeting on Saturday further names and additional committees will be appointed.

## FIRST DAY'S WORK OF CANVASSERS.

Salt Lake County Commissioners Count Six Districts.

### CHANGES NOT IMPORTANT.

Final Results as Given Out Not Affected—Counts in Other Parts of the State.

When the Salt Lake county board of canvassers adjourned on Monday afternoon, six election districts in the first precinct had been canvassed. There were a few changes, but none to reverse the general result as heretofore announced. The board decided to hold evening sessions after today, in order to get through the count by Saturday night. In addition to the progress of the canvass as noted in last evening's "News," the following tells the proceedings of the count up to the hour of adjournment:

In district No. 2, N. T. Porter has 222 votes instead of 234 as reported. In the same district H. N. Standish has 197 instead of 196, and J. H. Anderson 196 instead of 197.

In the third district an error was made in the count. N. T. Porter instead of 175, which was cast for him, and Morse has 263 instead of 244, the number at first credited to him. An error was discovered in L. M. Earl's vote, the number being 194 instead of 186. Ben R. Eldredge's vote was reduced one, the correct number being 202 instead of 203, while Lloyd went from 194 to 195.

In the fifth district Wells polled 265 votes instead of 255, Hines, 252 instead of 263, Harris 242 instead of 239, and Hammond 239 instead of 242.

In No. 6 Breiden secured 249 votes instead of 149 as reported. In the fifth district there were eight challenged votes sworn in, and in the sixth two challenged votes were sworn in.

The gains and losses in the six districts were as follows: N. T. Porter loses 12 votes in the second, and H. N. Standish and James H. Anderson lose 1 each. In the third district J. W. N. White, Democratic gains 15, Morse loses 11, Earl gains 9, Eldredge loses 1 and Lloyd loses 1. In the fifth Wells gains 10, Harris loses 11, Hammond gains 11 and Hines gains 49. In the sixth Breiden gains 109. At this point in the proceedings the canvassing board adjourned till 2 o'clock this afternoon. Today's record appears on another page of this issue of the "News."

DAVIS COUNTY. Nine districts of Davis county's returns were canvassed yesterday, with the result as heretofore announced, except that L. E. Abbott, Democratic candidate for sheriff is elected by two majority instead of one. C. Harton, Republican, by one majority, as counted up on the official returns, and one more vote to the total of J. G. M. Barnes, Democratic candidate for State senator, who now has a majority of 109 in Davis county. As this gives Mr. Barnes an unquestioned majority in the senatorial district, there will be no contest over the 12 illegal votes said to have been cast for the Democratic ticket in Farmington precinct.

### UTAH COUNTY.

In Utah county Mr. Storrs, the Democratic candidate for sheriff, was elected by a majority of 164, the other county officers being Republican. The highest majority was for Chapman, Republican, for county commissioner—578. All the Republican legislators were elected, thus insuring the Republicans a majority on joint ballot in the Legislature. The Senate is Democratic and the House Republican. Utah county's vote on national and State tickets is as follows:

President—Electors—Powers, 5,361; Tarbet, 5,284; Thorpe, 5,230; Walton, 5,228; Loane, 5,288; Murdoch, 5,288; Governor—Moyle, 5,380; Wells, 5,275; Secretary of State—Harris, 5,272; Auditor—Hays, 5,416; Tingey, 5,255; Treasurer—Lund, 5,129; Dixon, 5,246; Attorney General—Weber, 5,417; Breiden, 5,267.

Superintendent of Instruction—Porter, 5,329; Nelson, 5,260; Supreme Judge—Whitcomb, 5,354; Barch, 5,272; Congressmen—King, 5,476; Sutherland, 5,613. Mr. Sutherland's majority is 139, less than was expected, and makes the vote close between King and Sutherland in the State.

### WEBER COUNTY.

Ten of the precincts of Ogden city were canvassed yesterday, but no material changes made. The canvass was continued today.

### RICH COUNTY.

The official canvass in Rich county gives the following totals: For Electors—Walton, 285; Loane, 282; Murdoch, 287; Powers, 283; Tarbet, 282; Thorpe, 287. Sutherland, 300; King, 209; Wells, 282; Moyle, 288; Ellison, 289; Barnes, 291.

This count shows a loss of 29 votes for Sutherland from the unofficial returns. The official returns from Platte county are as follows: Electors—Walton, 227; Loane, 229; Murdoch, 229; Powers, 279; Tarbet, 277; Thorpe, 274. Sutherland, 216; King, 284.

### U. S. SENATORSHIP.

Question as to Who Will be Elected by the State Legislature.

The next State Legislature is expected to elect a United States senator to the vacancy which now exists from this State. Indeed, the next three Legislatures in this State will have a business of that kind. That of 1901 will fill the present vacancy; that of 1903 will elect a successor to Senator Rawlins; and that of 1905 will name a successor to the official named in 1901.

There is quite a list of candidates for the position. At least ten names will go before the Legislature. Some of them are volunteers, and some of them are being urged by their friends more suitable than some of the others, though they are not in the race in the sense of hunters for the position. Of course all are Republicans, the Democratic slate for Senators being wholly blank this time, since the verdict at the polls on Nov. 6.

The list of those who are candidates or are being urged for the position are: George M. Cannon, Arthur L. Thomas, O. J. Salisbury, Thos. Fitch, Arthur Brown, J. T. Hammond, Thos. Kearns, Reed Smoot, W. S. McCormick, and E. M. Allison. Eight of these are from Salt Lake City, and the remaining two from the outside, Reed Smoot being from Provo, and E. M. Allison from Ogden.

### BOXELDER COUNTY.

This canvass showed few changes from the unofficial returns. One of these was 1,559 for Sutherland, a loss of 6 from the unofficial report. King has 1,493, leaving Sutherland a majority of 166.

### BEAVER COUNTY.

In Beaver county there are no changes of importance on the national or State ticket. Sutherland's majority is 30.

### CARBON COUNTY.

In Carbon county the Republican ticket is well ahead, the only changes from unofficial returns being a loss of five in Sutherland's majority, which is now given as 99.

### EMERY COUNTY.

In this county the vote on national and State tickets is unchanged, except as to Mr. Sutherland, who gains 41 over the first report. On Congressional the vote is, King, 793; Sutherland, 664. King's majority in the county, 134.
