VACCINE A FAILURE.

Lively Discussion on Subject by Salt

Lake Medicos. Last evening's meeting of the Salt Lake Medical society was entirely devoted to the discussion of the merits and demerits of vaccine lymph as supplied by eastern houses to the local medical fraternity. Ere the meeting had been in session five minutes, it appeared that the medicos were anything but satisfied with the samples that had been for-warded to them by the supply houses during the epidemic last winter. Those present were particularly severe in their criticism upon the treatment at the hands of the Parke-Davis company of Detroit, who, it was alleged, utterly ignored the complaints of the doctors to the effect that the virus supplied was of no use whatever for the purpose for which it was designed. This company is said to have supplied impotent virus to the medicos and then when the latter wrote and mildly expostulated, their plaint was utterly ignored. The doctors did not like such treatment and last evening they voiced their sentiments and incidentally condemned all glycerinated lymph as being very unsatisfac-tory for the purpose of vacccination. The discussion was entered into by all

present, who related the circumstances surrounding their cause for complaint, During the course of the session a letter was read from the company in Detroit which set forth at length the virtues supposed to be in the glycerinated lymph, and suggested that some sudden and extreme changes in temperature were responsible for the cause of com-

The secretary was instructed merely to acknowledge the receipt of the letter, after which the meeting adjourned.

NEW TRIAL FOR MORRIS. Old County Furniture Case May be in the Local Courts Again.

The United States Supreme court at Washington, on Monday, dismissed the appeal of Charles Hart against the State of Utah, says a special to the Salt Lake Tribune. In this case Joseph R. Morris of Salt Lake, prior to the admission of Utah into the Union, was inlicted and charged with a felony. When it was called for trial after Statehood before Judge Hart, a trial by twelve jurors was demanded by the prosecution, but on objection by the defense, Judge Hart denied the applicatio. On appeal the Supreme court of Utah over-ruled this decision, and ordered the plaintiff in error (Judge Hart) to pro-ceed with the case and impanel the jury as demanded. Morris then appealed to the Supreme court of the United States, which took the action above stated. According to the above decision, Joeph R. Morris may be tried again on the charge of agreeing to receive a bribe in the matter of the city and county build-ing furniture deal made when Morris was a member of the County board. He has been tried twice and each time the fury disagreed. Before he came up for third trial the Supreme court of the United States decided that parties to have been committed prior to state lurors. When the case came up again ing eight a legal jury in all but capital cases and the deduction was that Morris could not be tried at all.

AN ACCOUNTING WANTED.

S. V. Trent has entered suit in the Third district court against his brother, L. C. Trent, in which an accounting is asked for, as well as the recovery of \$1,500, alleged to be due on a partnership transaction.

U. S. SENATORSHIP.

Question as to Who Will be Elected by the State Legislature.

The next State Legislature is expected to elect a United States senator to the vacancy which now exists from this State, Indeed, the next three Legislatures in this State will have a business of that kind. That of 1901 will fill the present vacancy: that of 1903 will elect a successor to Senator Rawlins, and that of 1905 will name a successor to the official named in 1901.

There is quite a list of candidates for the position. At least ten names will go before the Legislature. Some of them are voluntary candidates, and some of them are being urged by their friends more suitable than some of the others, though they are not in the race in the sense of hunters for the position. Of course all are Republicans, the Demo-cratic slate for Senators being wholly blank this time, since the verdict at the


