

RECOMMENDATIONS AS TO LEGISLATION

National Civic Federation Would
Have More Laws on Trusts
And Combination.

TO MEET CHANGED CONDITION

Modification Should Include Association
of Employers, Farmers' Unions and
Like—Non-Partisan Commission.

Chicago, Oct. 25.—Today's session of the National Civic Federation was given over to five-minute talks by business men, who discussed the various issues introduced by the various speakers during the last three days.

The committee on resolutions presented its report as follows:

"After 29 years of federal legislation, as interpreted by the courts, directed against the evils of trusts and combinations and against railroad rebates, beginning with the Interstate Commerce act of 1887, and the anti-trust act of 1890, a general and just conclusion exists that the experience gained in enforcing these federal acts and others covering them, demonstrates the necessity of legislation which shall provide more secure the benefits already gained and better meet the changed conditions which have arisen during a long period of active progress both in the enforcement of statute law and in the management of railroads and corporations. The changes now demanded are:

"First, immediate legislation is required, following the recommendation of the President, to create a non-partisan commission, permitting agreements between railroad corporations on reasonable freight and passenger rates, subject in all respects to the approval, supervision and action of the interstate commerce commission.

"Second, the enforcement of the Sherman act and the proceedings under it during the administration of Presidents Harrison, Cleveland, McKinley and Roosevelt, have accomplished great results in weakening the moral force of the American people in asserting the supremacy and justice of the law, thus effectively reducing the impression that great wealth and large corporations were too powerful to be brought under the law. This great advance has rendered more secure all property rights, resting, as they do, on a popular government, on universal respect for and obedience to the law. It is now that this work is accomplished it is revealed the necessity for legislation which shall maintain the law, and which shall be intended to secure and safeguard interests it was never expected to affect.

"As to the next step in all industrial and commercial relations, justice and equality of opportunity for all, with full sympathy and loyal support for every effort to enforce the laws in the United States, the congress should delay to pass legislation providing for a non-partisan commission, in which the interests of capital, of labor and of the general public shall be represented. This commission, like a smaller commission which proved most successful in Germany in 1870, shall consist of representatives of business and industrial combinations and of the general public, and shall have the power to investigate, manage and regulate the operations of corporations so far as the same may be affected by the public interest, and to preserve individual initiative, competition, and the free exercise of a free contract in all business and in industrial relations. Any proposed legislation should also include modification of the prohibitory new existing upon combinations on the following subjects:

MODIFICATIONS.

"First—National and local investigation of labor and their agreements with employers relating to wages, hours of labor and conditions of employment.

"Second—Associations made up of farmers, intended to secure a stable and equitable market for the products of the soil, free from fluctuations due to speculation.

"Third—Business and industrial agreements or combinations whose objects are in the public interest and are distinguished from objects determined to be contrary to the public interest.

"Fourth—Such commission should make a thorough inquiry into the availability of money for the purpose of federal loans or suspensions as a condition for the entrance of certain classes of corporations upon interstate commerce, and also into the relation to the public interest of the purchase by one corporation of the franchise or corporate stock of another. On no one of these subjects should anything be done until the commission has been organized and has begun its work.

"Fifth—The examination, inspection and supervision of great producing and manufacturing concerns, which have begun by the department of commerce and labor, and accepted by these corporations, should be enlarged by legislation, so that the department of commerce and labor should have complete authority in the centralization, transportation, charges and selling prices of all such producing and manufacturing concerns, whose operations are large enough to have a monopolistic influence. This should be determined as decided by some rule and classification to be decided by the commission already proposed.

"Sixth—The conflicts between the state and federal authorities raised in new states over railroad rates bring new under adjudication and under way in a final and ultimate decision by the federal supreme court, this conference should express its opinion on these issues affecting and conflicting in favor of this great issue to a tribunal.

London, Oct. 25.—Andrew Carnegie and Lord Axbury (formerly Sir John Lubbock) were today nominated for the office of lord rector of St. Andrew's university, Scotland. An election will be held Nov. 1. Neither candidate withdrew.

MAY SAPP'S MURDER.

Samuel F. Whitlow Held in \$10,000
Bail for It.

Toha, Kan., Oct. 25.—Samuel F. Whitlow was held in \$10,000 bail today for trial for the murder of Miss May Sapp, who was cut to death with a razor in her father's yard in Moran, Kan., on Sept. 27, and who, Whitlow says, committed suicide because of her infatuation for him. Whitlow was uncertain tonight as to whether he would be able to furnish the bond.

The prosecution introduced strong evidence to show that Miss Sapp had been murdered, and proved that Whitlow attempted suicide soon after he was arrested.

JAPS BUY AMERICAN RAILS.

Pittsburg, Oct. 25.—A contract for steel rails, estimated to 15,000 tons, is said to have been closed between the United States Steel corporation and the Imperial railway of Japan.

GREAT SCANDAL IN FRENCH NAVY

Officer Arrested as Spy Confesses
Stealing Signal Book
And Cipher Code.

HAD MOBILIZATION PLANS.

Ulimo is a Hebrew and Papers Call
Case a Second Dreyfus
Affair.

Paris, Oct. 25.—The arrest of Eusebio Charles Ulimo of the French navy at Toulon yesterday on a charge of being a spy, and who later confessed to having abstracted a secret naval signal book and the naval cipher code, was followed today by the arrest at Vendôme of an officer named Hurton, who is charged with negotiations with an agent of a foreign power for the sale of military secrets. The arrests are creating a great stir, as Ulimo is a Hebrew, the papers term this case a second Dreyfus affair.

It appears that Ulimo offered certain documents to the minister of marine for \$50,000, but that Ulimo's offer was accepted he would sell them to a foreign power. A dummy correspondence was begun, ending in Ulimo's capture. A search of his lodgings revealed that he only possessed a few secret code signals, but was in possession of complete plans for the mobilization of the French navy, the location of harbor mines in the event of war, photographs of the members of the French famous 75-millimeter field gun, etc.

The cases of Ulimo and Hurton added to the scandal which opened in the chamber of deputies this afternoon. On the interpellation regarding the state of naval defense, in connection with the charges made in a book entitled "Are We Defended?" recently published by Charles Humbert, an ex-army captain and staff officer of War Minister Andre, and a magazine article, the subject, of which Gen. Langlois is the author.

M. Gauthier and M. Laisne, authors of the interpellation, spoke at length upon the disorganization said to exist in the navy.

BIGGER PERMANENT APPROPRIATION FOR NAVY.

Washington, Oct. 25.—Naval matters occupied the attention of the cabinet during a considerable portion of today's meeting. Secy. Metcalf has just completed a compilation of the estimates for the maintenance of the naval establishment, and at the same time a great increase as compared with the current fiscal year, thereby promising to cause much debate in Congress at the approaching session, the president and the secretary also having their most earnest attention to them.

The secretary advanced a proposition to increase by \$5,000,000 the standing appropriation for the payment of enlisted men in the navy. According to his estimate this increase would admit of the recruitment of about 5,000 blue jackets in addition to the present force. The proposition was received with favor and included in the estimates to be submitted to Congress.

Another matter, not entirely naval in character, deemed worthy of report by Secy. Metcalf, because of its influence upon the character of vessels to be constructed in the future, was the recommendation of the Isthmian canal commission to build a new canal, a few days ago by Civil Engineer Roosevelt, looking to the widening of the locks of the Panama canal and this subject was discussed at some length.

REFRIGERATOR CO. RECEIVER.

Kansas City, Oct. 25.—A receiver for the Merchants' Refrigerator company, which conducts a large business in this city, was appointed tonight by Judge Phillips of the federal court, because of the disappearance of J. J. Edwards Brady, president of the company. There is a great quantity of perishable stock in the warehouse, which the directors urged as a reason why a receiver should be appointed.

ASK HUGHES FOR HOLIDAY.

Albany, N. Y., Oct. 25.—Gov. Hughes today received a number of telegrams suggesting with more or less urgency the propriety of his declaring by proclamation a legal holiday during which the financial situation might be relieved. The governor acknowledged receipt of all these messages without indicating in any way his intention in the matter. He would not discuss the question tonight, but there is good reason to believe that he will probably indicate his taking this radical step. He makes no secret of his deep concern about the financial disturbance and is watching it closely.

SERGT. BAKER KILLED ON CHEYENNE RESERVATION

St. Paul, Oct. 25.—A special to the Pioneer Press from Sturgis, S. D., says that Sergt. Baker, in charge of the distribution of rations to the Cheyenne Indians on the Cheyenne reservation, was killed. There is also a rumor, although not credited, that the Indians have been scalping.

Fort Meade is located near Sturgis, and the troops there are awaiting orders to move.

NO BAIL FOR GILLETTE.

Ex-Vice President of Mutual Life Remanded to the Tombs.

New York, Oct. 25.—Dr. Walter R. Gillette, formerly vice president of the Mutual Life Insurance company, who yesterday was convicted of perjury and remanded to the Tombs, was denied bail in the supreme court today, pending motions of appeal.

NORTHWEST CAR SHORTAGE.

Washington, Oct. 25.—Interstate Commerce Commission Lane conferred today with President Roosevelt regarding the shortage in the northwest. The president was assured that no present alarm need be felt on account of the lack of coal in the northwest, as the railroads had been shipping coal to that section

U. S. EXPRESS COMPANY HAS \$64,000 STOLEN.

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 25.—Investigation into a loss of approximately \$64,000 reported last night from the railway express office of the United States Express company in this city shows that the money was probably taken by an employee who was thoroughly familiar with the surroundings and with the best means of making away with the plunder.

The thief apparently had knowledge of the combination of a large safe in the express office, and the question of locating the safe has not yet been determined. Thomas McDonald, superintendent of the company, said:

"I am not yet in possession of facts which would warrant any statement to the press."

KILLED IN DRUNKEN FROLIC.

Butte, Mont., Oct. 25.—A dispatch to the Miner from Lewistown, Mont., states that during a drunken frolic on railroad grade in one of the Billings & Northern construction camps, William Smith, a colored man, was shot through the head and killed, the murderer shooting the victim from behind. The shooting had become pronounced during the frolic. This is the third murder at the camp within a month.
