

RECOMMENDATIONS AS TO LEGISLATION

National Civic Federation Would Have More Laws on Trusts And Combinations.

TO MEET CHANGED CONDITION

Modification Should Include Association of Employers, Farmers' Unions and Like—Non-Partisan Commission.

ATLANTA, Oct. 25.—Todays session of the National Civic Federation was given over to five-minutes talks by business men, who discussed the various topics introduced by the various speakers during the last three days.

The committee on resolutions presented its report as follows:

After 20 years of federal legislation, as interpreted by the courts, directed against the evils of trusts and combinations and against railroad rates, beginning with the Interstate commerce act of 1887 and the antitrust act of 1890, general and just conviction exists that the experience gained in enforcing these federal acts and others made it clear that a new and more effective legislation which shall render more secure the benefits already gained and better meet the changed conditions which have arisen during a long period of active progress, both in the enforcement of statutes now and in avoidance of grave abuses in the management of railroads and corporations, the changes now demanded are:

CHANGES DEMANDED.

First, immediate legislation is required, following the recommendation of President Roosevelt and the interstate commerce commission, permitting agreements between railroad corporations on reasonable freight and passenger rates, subject in all respects to the approval, supervision and action of the Interstate commerce commission.

Second, the enforcement of the Sherman act and the proceedings under it during the administrations of Presidents Harrison, Cleveland, McKinley and Roosevelt have accomplished great national benefits in preserving the integrity of the American system and in asserting the supremacy and dignity of the law, thus effectively refuting the impression that great wealth and large corporations were too powerful for the impartial execution of the law.

This great advance has rendered more secure the property rights, resting as they must under a public trust, on drivers of roads and obedience to the law.

We now that this work is accomplished it is revealed the necessity for legislation which shall maintain all that the Sherman act was intended to secure and warrant interests it was never expected to affect.

Third, in an industrial and commercial relations, just and equality of opportunity for all, with

full sympathy and loyal support for every effort to enforce the laws in the past we urge upon Congress without delay to pass legislation providing for a non-partisan commission, in which the interests of capital, labor and of the general public shall be represented.

This commission, like a similar commission which proved most successful in Germany in 1875, shall consider the entire subject of business and industrial combinations and report such proposals for the formation, capitalization, management and regulation of corporations (so far as the same may be subject of investigation) as will

still preserve individual initiative, competition, and the free exercise of a free contract in all business and inustrial relations.

Any proposed legislation should also include modifications of the prohibitory now existing union combinations on the following subjects:

TOOK RIDE TEST.

Thirteen Army Officers at Fort Leavenworth Take It.

Leavenworth, Kan., Oct. 25.—Thirteen field officers of the United States army today took the 15-mile test ride recently ordered by President Roosevelt.

London, Oct. 25.—Andrew Carnegie and Lord Avebury (formerly Sir John Lubbock) were today nominated for the office of lord rector of St. Andrew's university, Scotland. An election will be held Nov. 1. Provided neither candidate withdraws.

MAY SAPP'S MURDER.

Samuel F. Whitlow Held in \$10,000 Bail.

Iola, Kan., Oct. 25.—Samuel F. Whitlow was held in \$10,000 bail today for trial for the murder of Miss May Sapp, who was cut to death with a razor in her father's yard in Moran, Kan., on Sept. 27, and while Whitlow was committing this crime, a neighbor of his informed him. Whitlow was uncertain tonight as to whether he would be able to furnish the bond.

The prosecution introduced strong evidence to show that Miss Sapp had been murdered, and proved that Whitlow attempted suicide soon after he was arrested.

JAPS BUY AMERICAN RAILS.
