



THE Salt Lake tabernacle choir and the Salt Lake Festival association have joined hands to make the third annual musical festival, which occurs at the tabernacle Monday and Tuesday, May 10 and 11, a great success. The choir is dependent on the festival to assist them in going to the Seattle fair, Aug. 26 and 27. The choir members have received 2,000 season tickets, each member agreeing to dispose of at least five each. Three thousand two hundred dollars in prizes will be given away to those selling tickets; besides a Kimball grand piano valued at \$700, to be given to the purchaser holding the lucky coupon.

Mr. Graham, who will assume the management of the festival, has just returned from the northwest and learned, while there, that those in charge of the exposition are much elated over the fact that the famous Salt Lake tabernacle choir will take part. Mr. Graham met Mr. I. A. Nadeau, the director general of the fair, who has heard of the reputation achieved by the choir, and who has taken a personal interest in the matter. Mr. George Shry has promised his support to the festival and will do all in his power to assist the choir in these two events.

The festival will be given by the Chicago Symphony orchestra of 60 musicians and the Salt Lake tabernacle choir, festival chorus, and the Salt Lake Choral society. The orchestra will be under the direction of Charles M. Condit, conductor, and Adolf Rossewitz, who did such splendid work last year with this same orchestra. Coming from the east with the orchestra, will be the following quartet of well known vocal soloists: Alida Hennel, soprano; Miss Frahm, contralto; David B. Dugan, tenor; Frank Arthur Prelech, basso.

Besides this array of brilliant artists, the orchestra will include 10 instrumental soloists of whom the most prominent are Franz Wagner, cellist, and Guy Woodard, violinist. The famous pianist, Myrtle Elvyn, will be heard in conjunction with the big orchestra. The following music will be rendered by the choruses and the orchestra: Massenet's "Cavalleria Rusticana," by the festival chorus; Gounod's "Majlis," and Massenet's "Mireille"; Ladys' chorus, by the Salt Lake Choral society; and Spohr's "Last Judgment," by the tabernacle choir. The entire program will be announced in the very near future.

At the First Methodist church, the Easter cantata, "The Risen King," will be repeated tomorrow evening.
