**EASTERN.**

**Burned.**

**McConnellsburg, Pa., 8.**—Big Cave Tannery, owned by Henry Parker and Kerpin, was burned to day.

**Saved—Mails on the "Schiller."**

**NEW YORK, 8.**—The agents of the Schiller received another dispatch this evening from the agent at Plymouth, as follows:

"Hillers, first officer, Polmann, second officer, Heitz, 4th officer, Jansen and Packendorff, boat-awains, and Hirsch, sailmaker, are saved; also passengers T. O. West, Henry Stern, Mr. and Mrs. Jones, of Peab; Jan Dunk, Hester Frohm, Carl Kuhn, Marcus Portther, Schettengren, Jansen, Reiderer, Fehr and Williams; sailors, Stube and Bull, sailors, Goulsberg, Wallis and Petersen. The survivors are expected at Penzance to-morrow morning, when we will obtain a detailed list.—Signed Stevens, Penzance, May 8th."

The following is a list of the mails placed on board the Schiller for London, 32 bags of letters and papers, for Liverpool, 11 bags of letters and papers, for Glasgow, 8 bags of letters and papers; for Dublin, 11 bags ditto; for Cherbourg and Paris, 12 bags ditto; for Hamburg and the rest of letters and papers. The total number of letters is 38,000, and in addition to these there was on board the entire regular transatlantic mail, comprising 162 bags.

**WESTERN.**

**Vessels Lost—Warm Rains.**

**SAN FRANCISCO, 8.**—A dispatch from Sehome, W. T., reports that the bark Union, with coal, from Nantano to San Francisco, struck a rock and was wrecked on the coast of Sehome, on the 7th inst. She floated off with the tide and sank in ten fathoms. No lives were lost.

This morning the schooner Glenam parted her hawser at Russian River mill, and went to pieces on the rocks; the captain was drowned, and the crew saved.

A dispatch from Portland, Oregon, reports that the warm rains of the past two weeks will insure a bountiful grain crop throughout the State.

**FOREIGN.**

**GREAT BRITAIN.**

**Saved From the "Schiller."**

**LONDON, 8.**—The following passengers are known to have been saved among the first-class passengers, the following first-class passengers, and the following second-class passengers:—

Philips, and Karl Kull; second-class and steerage: Silas Hoester, Charles Thran, Carl Dantzen, Magnus Paulsen, and Charles Jones and wife; four other steerage passengers were saved, but their names have not yet been ascertained, as they are in a state of insensibility. The following members of the crew were saved:—Blumer, Packendorff, Weiser, Dan. Blackhouse, Rehberg, Jansen, Adams, Hansen, Blom, Jurgensen, Verneick, Fahler, Hoffmann, Engleron, Fiel, Winch, and Schweenke.

Up to this hour but forty-three of all who were on board are known to be saved. Twenty-five sacks of mail matter have been picked up near the wreck, among them a woman with a child clasped in her arms.

**LAST NIGHT'S DISPATCHES.**

**EASTERN.**

**WASHINGTON, 9.**—Richard R. Beattie has been appointed for the formation of the special provision for the Panama mail, and therefore no appeal will be taken to the Supreme Court. The department has decided that tobacco scraps are to be taxed to duty at the rate of thirty per cent. ad valorem, under the provision of the tariff for unmanufactured tobacco.

**Sauvages Duty Free, &c.**

The Treasury Department acquiesces in the judicial decision that German sausages are exempt from duty under the provisions of the tariff for foreign sausages, and therefore no appeal will be taken to the Supreme Court. The department has decided that tobacco scraps are to be taxed to duty at the rate of thirty per cent. ad valorem, under the provision of the tariff for unmanufactured tobacco.

**Coming on a Tour of Inspection.**

Superintendent Surgeon General, Jno. M. Woodard, of the Marine Hospital division of the Treasury Department, left to-night on a tour of inspection among the marine hospitals on the Pacific coast.

**The New Postal Rates—A Co-operative Movement.**

The Postmaster General yesterday issued an order carrying into effect, so far as this country is concerned, the treaty for the formation of a co-operative postal union concluded at Bern, last October. The new rates of postage will be in force on the 1st of July next, and will be uniform to all participating states except France, which does not enjoy the benefits of the union.

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
