LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

They were being led by dreams and other manifestations of the spirit. They had distributed a quantity of tracts, with all the copies of the News that reached them. They also loaned their books to people desirous of reading them, and were accomplishing some good. They were meeting with many friends, who showed them great kindness.

Sudden Prostration.—The Ogden Herald, of yesterday, relates the following about a former resident of this city:

This morning, as Mr. Thomas Wallace, clerk in the hardware store of Messrs. L. D. Wilson & Co., was pouring some varnish from a five-gallon can into a smaller vessel, being in a sloping position at the time, a gentleman entered the store, approached Mr. Wallace, and said, "Are those shovels come for sale at the same time as the shovels, (of course with no intention to buy them), when Mr. Wallace fell to the floor and became insensible. The blow caused temporary stagnation of the blood, and a chill to pass through his system. Mr. John Williams procured some stimulants, which were administered to him, but it was not until after two hours rubbing and other operations, that Mr. Wallace was able to resume his duties in the store.

Arizona and Palestine.—Not only the discoveries of antiquities on this continent, but the habits, customs and traditions of the aborigines indicate that they had an Israelitish origin, thus sustaining the position of the Book of Mormon on that point. Upon this subject the following, from the Tucson Star, will be perused with interest by some of our readers:

To the student of Biblical history there is much of interest to be learned from the habits and customs of the Mexican people. The glow, they say, they reap, they thresh and winnow the same as in Palestine 2,000 years ago. The grain is cut with the sickle, it is trampled out by horses, and winnowed by tossing it into the air. The gleaners, like Ruth of old, follow the reapers and enjoy their harvest. The wheat and corn is made into meal by hand, and the Scriptural "Two houses shall be grinding at the mill, the one shall be taken and the other left," is explained daily by customs of the primitive Mexicans. The nature of the country also adds lessons explanatory of Scriptural history. It is an enigma to the Sunday-school boy when he reads that the Egyptians persecuted the Jews by refusing to let them straw for their brick; but in Arizona we can readily see that adobe (sun-dried bricks) would fall to pieces without straw. To sleep on the roof is a custom, but in this climate it is most delightful; so it must have been in Palestine.

The story of Rebecca at the well, where Jacob met her when she came to get water. The equipage with which the Mexican carries the olla full of water on her head was equally well done by the girls of Palestine. The wearing of the shawl over the head and face, so habitual among the Mexican females, was as much a custom among the wives of Solomon. Settlements in those days were made by springs or streams; so are they in Mexico and Arizona.

The donkey was the beast of burden then; for the good man of Nazareth rode into Jerusalem on an ass, and 1-day the Mexican finds in his pack the donkey. The hospitality peculiar to the pastoral life of the Jews is fully met by the hospitality of the Mexican.

The feet of the weary traveler was a mark of respect and affection then; the Mexican wears the sandals wash his feet at the doors of his domiciles. These and many other things incident to Arizona and the primitive Mexican go far to explain many customs of Biblical times.
