What Attorney General Bishop Ad: vises County Attorney Goble.

Bishop today submitted the following reply to C. P. Gable, Esq., county attorney for Uintah county:

Dear Sir-In your favor of recent date you submit the following and ask to be advised thereon:

"Uintah county is about to erect a \$16,000 court house, Have the board of county commissioners the legal right, under the provisions of section 524 R. S. to advertise for, accept bids, and contract with different persons for var-fous clusses of work? For instance, for quarrying the rock, with one person, with anotherfor hauling it, with another for laying the rock, with another for burning the brick, with an-other for the lumber, with another for the carpenter work, with another for the hardware, and with another for the pointing; or must the contract be let for the erection of the entire building in accordance with the plans and spe-

ethcations?" Under the law generally, and particularly, section 524 R. S. to which you refer. I am of the opinion that the contract should be let for the erection of the entire building after advertise ment, in accordance with the plans and specifications theretofore adopted, and that the plan of dividing the work into classes, as suggested, would not con-form to the requirements of the law.

The new western freight classification of commodities makes 363 changes over the old schedule, 362 of which are advances while in one case only is a concession made. If one is a shipper of locomotives one gets the benefit of a slight concession which costs the rallroad companies nothing. Formerly there was no pass given for the return trip of the man in charge of the locomo tive transported, but the new schedule now grants such a pass. In all other cases the commodities have been either advanced in class or the minimum weight of carload lots has been increased.
