

## LIMITED KEEPS UP ITS RECORD.

"Still on Time" Was the News From the Los Angeles Express at Noon Today.

### PALATIAL TRAIN SERVICE.

Men Especially Have Their Every Want Attended to—Daily News Bulletin.

"Still on time," the Los Angeles limited was reported as eating up mileage across southern Nevada at noon, and there is every prospect that the splendid train will pull up after its long run in the City of the Angels at 4:45 this afternoon, on time to the dot.

Really, the handsome train could have done better than it did right through, but once the schedule was set, the way stations and sidings had to be passed according to instructions. Yesterday it was absolutely scandalous the way in which the engineer loafed on certain stretches in order to kill time. However, the engineer, after the fashion of his forebears, who drove stage coaches, always made it a point to let the train stand at a notch or two whenever there was a hamlet to be passed. After the experience on the initial run, it is a safe proposition to assert that the Santa Fe at last has a rival to be reckoned with on the run between Chicago and Los Angeles. Heretofore the Santa Fe has been "the cock of the walk," the new train promises to trim his comb.

### EIGHT PALATIAL TRAINS.

It cost a cool million to put on this new service, for taking eight trains, each representing \$125,000 in cold cash, to insure the runs being made each day without a break. Each train is a veritable hotel on wheels, solid vestibules, from baggage to observation cars, the strings of cars come near being absolutely perfect. No expense is spared and it will be a relief to the ladies with a weakness for sitting out on an observation platform and thoughtlessly allowing the wind to toy with their coiffure to know that they can find electrically heated curling tones in the dressing rooms. This is just one item to show how modern railroads look after the comfort of their patrons even down to the minutest items.

### ALL WANTS ATTENDED TO.

When it comes to the mere men, their temporal and "spiritual" welfare is also catered to. Twice a day a special news bulletin is struck off on a rotary mimeograph in the baggage car. At telegraph stations all the important news items of the day are handed on to the train and in due season every passenger has his miniature morning and evening paper. The club room in observation car is the own private domain of the sterner sex and judging from the manner in which it was patronized yesterday it is destined to become a decidedly popular institution.

### LIBELOUS EFFUSION.

In this connection the following clipped from a free lance sheet published on the train yesterday by some 25 obscure newspaper correspondents and newspaper men from New York and elsewhere, is grossly libelous and legal action is expected to be taken by the general passenger departments of the railroad operating the splendid train: "Gambling dens are running in our midst, with the full connivance of the authorities. The respectable element of our population are horror-stricken at the revelations being made in the Daily Coyote, Cincinnati. Steele's notorious resort was heavily patronized yesterday. A mysterious stranger took in most of the money. Jim Dorance lost 1 cent and two others, and J. M. Christmas trees are to be had this season in only half the quantity that was secured last year, and consequently prices are twice what they were last year at this time. The government will not allow cutting trees on reservations, and on patented lands there is a stumpage charge of 12½ cents for each tree made. Dealers say that at the rate trees are disappearing from private lands, there will be none at all in a couple of years.

### ONLY NOMINAL FINES.

Judge Sloan Disposes of Arizona Unlawful Collaboration Cases.

Prescott (Arizona) Herald: Yesterday morning Judge Sloan sentenced nine "Mormons" to pay a fine of \$100 each for violating the Edmunds act. The defendants all reside in Navajo and Apache counties. The men were arrested and indicted before the last term of the United States court. They furnished bail and were allowed to go their way until the next term of court. All of those pleaded guilty, with the exception of two, and one of them, L. M. Savage, changed his plea of guilty to not guilty. Andrew Gibbons, was tried here yesterday and found not guilty.

J. P. Rothlisberger, J. W. Tanner, Joseph W. Fish, W. Smith, J. E. Tanner, S. N. Butler and Jesse N. Smith were the men sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 each. The fine was suspended for 30 days, before the expiration of which time the attorney for the defendants promised that the fines would be paid. Unless the fines were paid the sentence was that the men should serve the fine out at the rate of 25¢ per day. There is no danger of any of them serving out the sentence, as they will all hustle up the money.

The above has reference to some old cases, accounts of which have appeared in the Deseret News from time to time. The marriages were contracted years ago—before the manifesto. This is well understood in Arizona and the knowledge of the fact doubtless caused the court to impose only the light fines as chronicled in the paper quoted from.

### ROSS RECOVERING.

Colored Burglar May Not Have to Lose a Limb.

William Ross, the colored burglar who was badly wounded by Officer Brown yesterday morning, is reported as getting along quite well. He is still at the L. D. S. hospital, with Dr. Wilcox in attendance. The latter stated this morning that Ross would probably recover, but would have a stiff leg all his life. Whether or not the leg will have to be amputated depends entirely on developments in the case. If blood poisoning sets in, the injured member will have to come off.

## UTAH FUEL OUT WITH A LETTER.

Says Consumer and Dealer Are To Blame for Present Coal Famine.

### SHOULD HAVE AVOIDED IT.

This Could Have Been Done by Putting in a Supply During the Summer Months.

The Utah Fuel company today added its contribution to the literature of the coal famine. In a letter addressed to the Manufacturers and Merchants' association, Sales Manager W. H. Myers of the company, states his belief that the consumer is to blame for the shortage, because he did not buy his coal in the summer, and that the dealer is to blame because he did not stock his yards against the coming of winter. For the company, he states that its mines are working to their full capacity, and that in the summer months the work is so light that many miners are laid off and then cannot be found when needed in the winter. In order to relieve the Salt Lake situation he states that the company is refusing better orders from other sources. The text of the letter of explanation is as follows:

Gentlemen: I have a copy of your communication of 16th inst., addressed to the Utah Fuel company, the Union Pacific Coal company, and the Kemmerer Coal company, relative to the present shortage of coal, and improving the coal producers to arrange, in some manner, to relieve the situation. Speaking for the Utah Fuel company, I beg to advise that we fully realize the seriousness of the present situation and are doing everything in our power to afford relief. Our mines are working full time and are producing a full output. In the filling of orders, we are and have been for several weeks past, giving preference to the Salt Lake trade, in many cases refusing new business offered us, which would mean a considerable larger tonnage during the summer months, than what will be given us by many of the dealers and industries we are trying to supply.

For your information I say that one of the principal causes leading up to the present shortage, if not the principal one, is that the consumer as well as the dealer made no attempt to provide himself, during the summer and early fall months, with a reserve which could be drawn upon during the time of a shortage.

Under the present growth of this country, the consumer should use some foresight in the purchase of his coal as no operator can work his mines to a point of fully supplying the demand, and with promptness, during the winter months, unless during the summer there is a large enough demand to provide work for the miners more than half time, as otherwise they leave camp and it is impossible to get them back when they are needed.

If each consumer would, during the months of July, August and September, store a surplus, based upon his requirement, the chances for a coal shortage would be minimized.

### RAYBOULD DELIGHTED.

Enthusiastic Over Outlook for Elks' Trip to California.

Secretary A. W. Raybould of the Elks returned this morning from Los Angeles delighted with his trip. He went to southern California to arrange for an excursion from this city to Los Angeles about February 18 next, and was successful, so that he anticipates the greatest excursion in the history of the road, and a remarkably fine time. Mr. Raybould is enthusiastic over

southern California and its winter climate. He visited Venice, which is booming away stronger than ever, and ordinary sized lots are selling along the sea shore at prices that would make the ordinary tenderfoot pale. Venice is growing so fast and is becoming so substantial in its permanency that all doubt is being dispelled as to its future, and the city is regarded as a fixed, established fact.

Mr. Raybould was told that already there are 100,000 winter visitors in and around Los Angeles, and many more are coming in. A feature of the trip was the ride west of Los Vegas, where oil burning locomotives are used, and where the roadbed for a yard on each side of the track is heavily oiled. So that, with no dust from the roadbed, and no smoke or chuffs from the engines, the ride is of the pleasantest character. Mr. Raybould was assured that the Salt Lake road would be given the heartiest reception at Los Angeles. The weather was windy and pleasant—ideal southern winter weather.

### CHRISTMAS DAY IN RUSSIA.

In certain parts of Russia the children at Christmas eve begin playing pranks that are as odd as they are amusing. Chief among their drolleries is that of disguising themselves as animals and in the assumed costume of wild beasts disporting themselves through the neighborhood. As many skins as possible are secured, and in these the leading boys are clad. Wolves, bears, ostriches even, are represented. All of the boys gather in one party, and as they are not so well as brutes forming a train for the escort and display of the pseudo menagerie. Some act as keepers, holding their disguised companions in check, while others startle the quiet of the night by rude strains drawn from harsh and primitive musical instruments. Torches are borne, and in the fitting light opposed by black shadows, the scene is at once grotesque and vivid.

### FRENCH CANADIAN CUSTOMS.

A French Canadian New Year's custom now nearly obsolete was that known as La Quete de l'Enfant Jesus—the collection for the infant Jesus. This collection was managed by the parish priest, who was driven round among his parishioners by the senior churchwarden or the beadle. The gifts that he thus gathered "for the love of the infant Jesus" on the festival of the circumcision, were distributed among the poor. Intimately connected with this was another practice of collecting alms for the poor, known as La Guignoles or La Ignoles. The words signify both a custom and a song. On the eve of the new year bands of masqueraders serenaded the various residents of the locality after nightfall with music and song, knocking at doors and windows and begging for offerings for the poor, generally eatables, with threats of revenge if gifts were refused. A piece of pork with the tail sticking, called La Chignee, was the traditional offering expected.
