After that copper for current use will still be dealt in large amounts and this current use will mean an active copper market right along."

How correct roots would. Speaking of copper pools and the in-variable failure of these, Mr. Guggen-heim said: "The reason is easily seen. About 150,000 tons of the metal is about as much as any speculator or group of speculators is able to carry. After that amount, has been acquired the banks do not, as a rule, care to further finance the project and when another bunch of copper is placed on the market, the pool is unable to sup-port the market it has created and the price goes down with a bump. "In this manner in the past copper has been pushed to a valuation of 20 cents and in some cases more, a purely inflated profit. The first few who do this get their money at the current rate of the metal, but if the selling continues, as it generally does, it is only a question of time when the capital of the pool is exhausted and the inevitable decline results. Fifteen cents, however, is not too high for copper, and I look to see the market reach that point and remain there." LARGEST IN WORLD. "Our Garfield smelter is now the larg-est custom smelter in the world and at this time we are handling about 60,-000 tons of ore a month. The manage-ment has been ordered to requisition freely for everything necessary to in-crease the capacity of the plant from time to time as the business requires it, and new furnaces and converters will be added just as rapidly as the ton-nage justifies it. We want to give the mine owner a square deal and we want to handle his ores promptly and no ex-pense will be spared to enable us to do this. The Steptoe plant is now turn-ing out about 3,500 tons of copper a month and the capacity of this plant is being increased steadily to take care of the tremendous output of the mines."
