WILL FIGHT COMPULSION.

Strong Action Taken at a Citizen's Mass Meeting.

Kaysville Davis Co., Jan. 20.—The people of Kaysville and Layton and Syracuse are greatly stirred up over the situation regarding the schools and compulsory vaccination, and meetings were held to protest against the action of the board.

On Saturday afternoon a large meeting of the representative citizens of Kaysville and Layton was held here to take some action that will cause the schools to be opened to the children that are not vaccinated. There was an overwhelming sentiment in opposition to compulsory vaccination, and a majority of those present seemed to regard the order excluding unvaccinated children from the public schools as an attempt at compulsory vaccination.

T. H. Phillips was chairman of the meeting. A report was received from the board of health, that they had sent Salt Lake and interviewed Dr. Beatty on the question of opening the schools when smallpox had disappeared. The report was to the effect that Dr. Beatty would give the committee no satisfaction, and led them to believe that the order is a permanent one.

At this point, John R. Barnes offered this resolution, which was adopted without a dissenting vote:

"Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the chairman of this meeting to draft a petition, obtain signatures thereto, and present the same to the legislature at as early a date as possible, praying for the immediate passage of some measure making it unlawful for any board of health, or other board, to compel vaccination or in any manner to make it a condition precedent to the attendance of children in private schools and resolved further, that the Hon. J. G. M. Barnes and the Hon. O. P. Hatch, the present senator and representative, respectively, of this district and county, be urged to use their influence in favor of the object desired, and

"Resolved, That copies of this resolution be presented to the state senator of this district and to the representative of this county."

John R. Barnes, H. J. Sheffield and Hyrum Stewart were appointed to prepare a petition to be presented to the legislature as proposed in the resolution. This was done and it is being numerously signed.

The question of opening the schools to unvaccinated children without the consent of the state board of health, was discussed, and several of those present expressed themselves as being in favor of asking the trustees to do so, even if a lawsuit followed. Some pledged to the trustees their financial and moral support in opposition to the action. No definite action was taken, however.

A similar meeting was held at Syracuse.
