Small Things in Judge Barick's Division this Morning.

MORE ADMISSIONS TO CITIZENSHIP

The County Court and the Irrigation Congress at Beaver-Territorial Board of Equalization.

A session of the Third district court was held by Judge Barick this morning, at which the following business was done:

In the case of John Alberger et al vs F. L. McClain, on motion of Attorney Sennedick, the intervention was allowed to be filed. It was ordered that the receiver pay said sum.

TERRITORIAL COURT.

All the members were present at this morning's session of the territorial court, at which no matter of special interest cropped up.

A petition from D. B. Britton and Francis McDonald, for the establishment of an additional new irrigation right, was filed and active interest declared for one week. Petitioners stated that their own stockyards are centrally located, being on the route between Murray and the Ogden divide of the Cottonwood, west of the place previously designated; they ask that their right be secured.

A communication was received from C. L. Stevenson, secretary of the Irrigation Commission for Utah, in relation to the irrigation congress which will take place at Denver, Colo., during the first week in September next. The importance of Utah being able to present irrigation petitions, and that the Utah report be made in the convention concerning water rights, lands, and other matters, giving the conditions in Utah, should be correctly prepared and properly represented; that the voice of the State of Utah should be heard in framing both national and state irrigation legislation.

To secure the necessary data and information the Irrigation Commission for Utah had arranged to have the report made under the auspices of the Polytechnic society of Utah. This expense, the secretary would be heavy and that the committee had decided to apply to the county courts in the leading counties to get the work done. They hoped this court would assist to the extent of appropriating the sum of \$125.

Several more petitions for rent from tax sale were read and approved. The county treasurer reported funds on hand sufficient to pay registered county warrants up to and including No. 200.

The county physician (Dr. Werthgen) reported one county patient at present in the Marine hospital and two in St. Mary's.

A number of appropriations were made.

BOARD OF EQUALIZATION

COURT COULDS.

J. F. McCarron & Co. have brought suit in Commissioner McNally's court to recover from the defendant a barrel of whiskey. The report was filed in the Utah Pacific court by the sheriff under attachment against the proprietor of the defendant's saloon. Plaintiff claims that as the goods were shipped to him they became his property and were not subject to attachment.

Justice Lochrie on Saturday afternoon set aside in supplementary proceedings in the case of the Fellers Furniture company vs John Fellers, in which the plaintiff had judgment for \$250 against the defendant. Mr. Miller Engles, agent of the defendant, was examined, but was denied having the defendant's property. His honor took the case under advisement and will file his findings of fact and conclusions of law in the Utah district court in a few days.

Axon turn over the two shares of the Fellers' New York Life company given them without consideration, to be applied on the judgment against the Fellers.
