FORTY-SIXTH CONGRESS.

CONGRESSIONAL HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 31.—A resolution was adopted calling on the Secretary of War for information as to the names and general rank of officers not on duty with their regiments and corps but on duty elsewhere.

The house at two o'clock discontinued public business, when eulogistic addresses were made in the memory of Rush Clark, of Iowa.

Keller presented the petition of Jere Haralson, relative to the contested election case of Haralson against Shelly, from the Fourth district of Alabama, and asked that it be printed and referred to the committee on elections. Some opposition was made on the ground that it was competent for the committee on elections to order its printing finally Keller's motion was agreed to. The memorial sets forth in his petition that after the declaration of the result of the congressional election in Alabama, he was ordered to take depositions for use in his interest, but that the mayor of Selma and other officers authorized by law to take depositions, refused to do so on the ground that it would be working against the interests of the democratic party. He alleges that General Shelly procured indictments against all the witnesses summoned in his (Haralson's) behalf, and had them arrested, cast into jail, and kept there till the witnesses were nearly all taken care of and expired. He also alleges that General Shelly paid, or caused to be paid, a large sum of money to the officers of election at several precincts in Lawrence county to refuse to resign election returns; and he appeals to the House for investigation.

After speeches by Messrs. Price, Sapp, Thompson, Carpenter, Coffroth, Manning, Neal, Bennett and Henderson, who were, in the order of respect to the memory of the deceased, adjourned.

EASTERN WASHINGTON NOTES.

WASHINGTON, 31.—The Secretary of the Treasury has increased the bullion fund of the Denver mint to \$120,000, and authorized the purchase of silver by the assay in change, in lots of less than \$10,000 ounces.

Fernando Wood has proposed to Secretary Sherman as a compromise in the matter of 34 per cent, by which a 25 cent bond is issued, to be known as a 10-40 bond.

The French government officially disavows any intention to set up a protectorate on this continent, or to guarantee or protect or in any way make itself responsible for, or on account of the plans of M. de Lesseps in the negotiations for the building of an inter-oceanic canal. It regards M. de Lesseps as an eminent French citizen, but his plans on the isthmus have no political consequences.

The Indian appropriation bill appropriate in the aggregate \$1,498,846, which is \$219,933 less than the appropriation of last year. The principal items of decrease are for the Red Cloud and Spotted Tail Sioux, namely, 85,000 pounds less last year; Xantus, 15,000; industrial schools, 10,000; expenses of Indian commissioners, \$7,500.

New Hampshire, Vermont and Massachusetts having raised \$10,000 for a monument in commemoration of John Stark's victory at Bennington, Va., over the British under Gen. Burgoyne, on the 16th of August, 1777, petition Congress for a national recognition and appropriation of \$20,000.

Gov. Pitkin, of Colorado, to-day completed his testimony before the House committee on Indian affairs. It related to free set and depredations committed by the Indians in Southern Colorado, and to the injurious effect upon mining settlements along the border of the reservation occasioned by the changed relations between the whites and Indians since the recent outbreak. He was also examined as to the character of the late Agent Meeker. In reply to inquiries Gov. Pitkin said he favored giving land in severalty to Indians in Eastern Utah, throwing open the Colorado reservation to settlement by whites and giving the Indians everything realized from the sales of the lands of their reservation.

Senator Blaine to-day celebrates his 50th birthday. He has become quite grey, but otherwise he looks younger and stronger than he did four years ago.

Senator Don Cameron left Washington, last night, for Harrisburg to remain there until after the convention.

Secretary Evans has expressed great interest in the Centennial Exhibition at Yorktown, Va., and said the State department would, in correspondence with the French government, make a strong point of its importance and the desire of the U. S. Government that the French will take an active and hearty part in the ceremonies. Most of the governors of the original 13 States have appointed commissioners to represent them in the novel and varied nature of which has been already suggested which will be enthusiastically worked up to a formal invitation will be sent to the French government to participate in the ceremonies, and the French Society in New York are now in correspondence on the subject. It is understood the descendants of Lafayette will attend. A French fleet and at least one regiment of French troops are expected. One week is to be set aside for the reception and entertainment of the French guests. An extensive parade ground will be laid out, and festivities of all kinds including concerts, provided for day and night.

Well informed parties in the Indian service say that the late Commissioner Hay was Secretary Schurz's favorite officer; that Schurz had caused the summary withdrawal of Commissioner J. Q. Smith, against President Hayes' private wishes, and insisted on Hay's appointment, although Schurz had previously removed him for cause from the board of Indian Commissioners. That Schurz has been persistent in his defense of Hayes against the growing opposition and alienation of the best friends of the Indians from the Administration,
