LOCAL BRIEFS.

Richard O'Neil, a Nevada cattleman, is in the city for treatment of an injured hand.

Private Joseph S. Wimer of the First Regiment band was fined \$5 by summary court Thursday evening, for three unexcused absences from band practice.

The semi-monthly meetings of the Utah Federation of Labor will be hereafter open to the press and the public. These meetings are held the first and fourth Friday in each month.

The men's club of the First Congregational church will hold the regular December meeting this evening, in the parlors of the church, when Hon. Fisher Harris will speak on "Greater Salt Lake," and "See America First."

James McPherson Shockey is employed in the bakery at the state prison, and is becoming a first-class baker. He was tried, after sentence, at the knifing machine, but as an operative in that line he was not successful enough to warrant his being kept there.

Section Director Hyatt of the weather office has returned from a trip of inspection of voluntary stations about the state, and says that a station will shortly be established at Milford to be maintained by the postmistress at that point. Dr. Hyatt reports considerable snow all over the state.

Miss Van Horn Bagley, daughter of the former attorney general of Idaho, entertained 24 L. D. S. hospital nurses in a Salt Lake Theater party Saturday night. A sister and grandfather of Miss Bagley have been patients at the hospital, and the party was in appreciation of the attentions shown them by the nurses.

The Columbian Dramatic company will give entertainments at the various ward halls in the Pioneer Stake during the winter. The members of the company are Prescott Erickson, Hyatt Wright, Truman Gleason, Lester Price, Frank Robinson, Ethel Stingers, S. Clark, and Inez Clark. Edith Burns acts as musical director.

Word has been received at the sheriff's office that United States Marshal A. N. Wilcox of Durant, I. T., is now on his way to this city after Robert Polson, who was arrested here Friday night by Deputy Sheriff Sharp and who is wanted in Durant for murder. Polson is a half-breed Indian, and admits that he is the man wanted.

The Knights of Columbus held their annual meeting this week when the following officers were chosen: Grand Knight, W. P. O'Connell; deputy grand knight, W. J. Halloran; lecturer, H. V. Meloy; warden, H. Fafek; treasurer, C. A. Locke; secretary, W. L. Duffy; trustee, J. H. McDonald. The local council has now 150 members, with the number increasing.

Rehearsals are being held nightly for the unique patriotic entertainment to be given next Thursday by company H of the National Guard, at the armory. The program will be illustrated in a novel way. Mr. O'Connell, of "Buster Brown" fame, has some very thrilling sketches for the company. One of these may be seen on Main street, and will especially interest the musical fraternity.

The report of the sewer committee of the city council allowing Philip's Congregation to connect the parsonage with the sewer upon certain conditions, which would practically amount to a partial abatement of the sewer tax, has been vetoed by Mayor Morris, who states that the council has no authority to abate the tax, as no error or injustice appears to have been made in the assessment.

The Prison Society of Christian Endeavor was addressed yesterday morning by Rev. Dr. R. G. McNeice, dean of Westminster college, on the subject of conversion, and Prof. Claude Nettleton favored the society with a baritone solo. Miss Nettleton playing the organ accompanied. Attendance at the Endeavor service is entirely voluntary, and yesterday's service was attended by 100 convicts.

L. L. Nunn, manager of the Telluride Power company at Provo, has filed application with the state engineer for 40 second feet of water from Beaver river, in Beaver county, with which to furnish power, light, and heat at Beaver, Milford, Frisco, Newhouse and Gold Mountain mines, from two 56-inch Pelton wheels, producing 5,250 horse power. H. J. Harding and E. D. Harmonist are for 600 second feet of water from the Green river in Uintah county, to be used in irrigating 5,600 acres of land.

Captain Marx of the Marine corps now visiting in Salt Lake, will be stationed in command of the marine at a naval recruiting station in San Francisco harbor. He is feeling particularly good over the outcome in the football tournament between the eleven from his vessel, the Baltimore, and the teams of the other vessels of the Asiatic squadron. The Baltimore has only 300 men, while other ships like the Ohio, each have crews numbering as high as 800 men. The Baltimore's team cleaned out everything in the fleet.

GOV. CUTLER ON DIVORCE.

Believes States Should Have Uniform Laws on the Subject.

Gov. Cutler, in a letter to Gov. Pennypacker of Pennsylvania, gives his views of the necessities of uniform divorce laws and the work necessary to be considered by the "divorce" congress in Washington on Feb. 13, in the following language:

"In connection with this announcement of my appointment of delegates, I wish to assure you of my hearty sympathy with the purpose of the congress. The subject of divorce is so intimately connected with the life of the nation, and its proper regulation so vital to the continuance and integrity of the home, that I know of no more important matter now requiring the attention of legislators and reformers.

"The lack of uniformity in the laws of the different states on this subject, and the laxity with which the laws are enforced in some places, have had a tendency to make the marriage covenant a matter of insufficient and often contemptuous thought.

"Marriages contracted in one state have been annulled in others, and it has been too easy for those who have lightly taken upon themselves marital obligations, lightly to cast them off. Any assemblage of thoughtful men and women, pledged to a reform of these undesirable conditions, is worthy the earnest support of all who seriously regard the perpetuity of our national life. I therefore give to the movement my unqualified approval."

The resignation of James H. Anderson as a member of the committee appointed by Gov. Cutler under authority granted by the Legislature, to investigate the duplication of studies in the University of Utah and the Agricultural college, has been accepted by Gov. Cutler and Principal George A. Eaton of the High school has been appointed to fill the vacancy.

Union Men Confer. Discuss Matter of Telephone Company's Refusal to Recognize.

The Electrical Workers' union held a lengthy conference yesterday afternoon, among themselves, on the matter of forcing the Bell Telephone company to recognize the Union and reinstate the inside men and installers who have joined the latter body and are no longer in the company's employ. It was decided to hold another conference with the company's management pending the appeal to the national officials of the Electric Brotherhood. Such a conference is being held today.

As to the sympathetic strikes the Union men agree that there shall be no strike or any tying up of the system, but that all demands and troubles shall be submitted to a board of arbitration.
