It Was Greater in Salt Lake City Than Other Parts of Utah.

### Only Fifteen Hundredths of an Inch Fell, However-Grew Gradually Less Both North and South.

The rainfall that occurred in this city last night was most welcome and caused many people to imagine that it came in considerable quantities whereas only fifteen hundredths of an inch fell.

Inquiry at the office of the Salt Lake Weather Bureau today developed the fact that Salt Lake enjoyed the greatest precipitation of any section of the State, the downfall growing lighter both north and south until it disappeared altogether. For instance, at Cedar City there was but four-hundredths of an inch of rain while over the Colorado inch of rain, while over the Colorado-Utah line at Grand Junction there was simply the faintest trace. Mr. Murdock of the weather bureau is of the opinion that the rain reached as far south as St. George, but says the probability is that is was so reduced in quantity at that point as to do little more than to

settle the dust ai most. Going north from Sait Laks City, the precipitation also grew gradually less until when Pocatello was reached there was no rain at all. In the central part of the State considerable good will result though the fall is not what farmers and stock men hope for by any means. The dry wheat farms of Tooele, Salt Lake, Davis, Boxelder and Cache counties, will be most benefited.
