SULU ISLANDS TREATY.

Lodge Will Urge Senate to Ratify Treaty for Their Purchase.

New York, Jan. 22 .- A special to the

Tribune from Washington says: Senator Lodge will endeavor to se cure the approval of the Senate in exsigned by Secretary Hay and Duke de Arcos, the Spanish minister on Nov. 7 last, for the purchase by this govern-ment of certain small islands in the Sulu group which had not been included in the Paris treaty of cessation. This treaty was sent to the Senate early last month and consists essentially of the following article:
Spain relinquishes to the United

States all title and claim of title which she may have had at the time of the conclusion of the treaty of Paris to the Philippine archipelago, lying outside the lines described in article III of that treaty and particularly to the islands of Cagayan, Sulu and Sibutu and their dependencies and agrees that all such islands shall be comprehended in the cession of the archipelago as fully as if they had been expressly included with-

The United States, in consideration of this relinquishment, will pay to Spain the sum of \$100,000 within six months after the ratification of this treaty.

The Spanish cortes has just approved the convention, and it only awaits ac-tion by the Senate for the exchange of atlfications, which are to be made in

The appropriation to carry out the agreement must be made this session it the treaty is approved, but it cannot be the Senate has authorized ratification.

CHICAGO LEADS IN CRIME. State's Attorney Deenen Makes This Terribie Assertion.

Chicago, Jan. 22 .- "Chicago leads all other cities of the world in crime," said State's Attorney Deenen, addressing the Chicago Congregational club at the Palmer house last evening. Then the speaker quoted statistics to show that arrests and criminal prosecutions here were greater in number proportionate to population than in London or New

He charged that lentency in prosecu tion is largely responsible for this state of affairs. Many confirmed criminals, he said, escape punishment time and again on the police courts through poli-tical influence and so grow to feel a contempt for the agencies of the law. About one-third of the prisoners held o the grand jury are discharged, he

He held education beginning with the cradle was the only remedy for criminal tendencies.

William Kent, another speaker, cited many instances of the evil effect of po-litical influence on police work. Owing chiefly to political conditions, the police and crimina's were, he said, often on the closest of terms.

BELONGED TO ENGLISHMAN.

State Department Expects Definite Information from Sargent - No Dispatches from Loomis.

Persons who arrived here today from the mainland of Venezuela report that the Venezuelan gunbout Miranda has burned the sloop Maria Teresa, owned by a subject of Great Britain.

It is said that the government suspected that arms for the rebels were being imported from Trinidad and ordered that vessels trading with this island should be stopped.

The Maria Teresa, which was anchored at Guira attempted to move to smoother waters. The Miranda's men, without question or explanation, are said to have taken possession of the op, thrown kerosene over it and urned it to the water's edge. The Umpire, the Trinidad and the Co-

NO NEWS IN WASHINGTON.

New York, Jan. 22 .- A dispatch to the Times from Washington says: In all probability something definite will be received shortly throwing light on what is happening in Venezuela, Lieut, Comdr. Sargent reports that he is going to Curacoa, nominally to coal, It is suggested at the state and navy departments that he is going there so that he may send dispatches without fear of their being tampered with by the Venezuelan government. It is even robable that he may have some of dinister Loomis' dispatches.

Curacoa is in the Dutch West Indies, and there are several points in Vene-zuela where Lieut. Comdr. Sargent could coal if the situation were not so trained. Porto Cabello, for instance, is half way between Laguayra and Curacoa. It is a small port town on the Venezuelan coast where American war essels frequently coal, and the Scordon will pass it on her way to Curacoa, Naval officers say that if the Scorpion s really going so far out of her way to coal it is because difficulties are placed in the way of her getting it at a Vene-

It is hardly believed that the Venezurefuse point blank to let an American vessel coal at Porto Cabello or any other Venezuelan port, but there are number of ways in which the same end could be reached without an absolute refusal. The authorities could, for instance, claim that they were out of coal, or they could raise the price,

There are still no dispatches from Minister Loomis bearing on the situa-The Venezuelan authorities have allowed him to send one dispatch, but it does not bear in any way, it is asserted upon the trouble between the two countries and relates to an unimportant matter of routine. If he has succeeded in getting dispatches into Lieut, Comdr. Sargent's hands, they should be here

BAD MEN ARRESTED.

Have Many Aliases and are Wanted in Many States.

Mt. Vernon, III., Jan. 22.-George W. and John Reeves, alias Thompson, alias Clark, wanted in at least three different States to answer for various crimes from murder to petit larceny, have be arrested in the northeastern part of this county by Sheriff Manion, Policeman county by Sheriff Marion, Policeman Satterfield and Deputy Sheriff Stanley. On June 1, 1885, near Huntingbur, Ind., Bob Reeves and his two sons. George and John, killed Deputy Sher-iff's Gardner and Cox of Dubols county. The father is said to have died. The sons went to Kentucky, where they assumed the name of Thompson, and on Jan. 9, 1888, were sentenced from Monroe county to a term of 31 years in the penitentiary for arson and burglary, On September 28, 1896, they escaped from the Frankfort prison and made their way to this county, where they assumed name of Clark and have since resided here.

DUEL IN ARIZONA. One Man Killed and Two Very Badly Wonnded.

Phoenix, Ariz., Jan. 22.-Particulars were received here today of a fatal duel at Springville, in Apache county, Montie Slaughter was killed by ex-Sheriff Beeler, and Clare Peary was badly wounded. Beeler was in a saloon when Slaughter came in and opened fire on him with a Winchester, Beeler seized a shot gun and Slaughter fell dead at the first shot. Peary, who stood near by, was struck by several shot from Beeler's gun. Beeler and Slaughter were cattle men, and bad blood had existed between them for a leng time,

New York, Jan. 22.-In discussing the critical condition of the queen and the ascension of the Prince of Wales the London correspondent of the Tribune says: Precedents have closely engaged the

attention of the law officers of the crown with a view to the emergency. The reform act of 1867 has an explicit provision that if parliament at the time of the sovereign's death be separated by adjournment or prorogation it must assemble immediately. As there is an adjourned session of the new parlia As there is an ment the two houses must meet at least the day after the queen's death. The object of this statute, is clearly to bring in parliamentary privilege in regulat-ing and sanctioning the succession to the throne. In this emergency it would e a short, formal session for admin-stering the oath of alleriance to the lew king, and there would probably be an immediate adjournment or prorogation until a later period in the spring. Treasury officials are quoted as wondering how, if no legislative business will be done until May, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach can get on without finan-cial supplies and lacreased borrowing powers when the war is still in progpowers when the war is still be ress. THE CANADIAN PARLIAMENT. Queen Victoria's Death Will Not Cause it to be Dissolved.

New York, Jan. 22 .- A special to the

World from Ottawa, Ont., says: The death of the queen will not caus dissolution of the Canadian parlia ment, according to Sir John Bouerno the highest constitutional authority I this country. It is a maxim of English constitutional law that the sover eign never dies, the succession of the presentation to the throne is instantan-

The demise of the crown is the only contingency upon which the English parliament is required to meet immedi-ately, even on Sunday, without summons, in the usual form. The reform act of 1867 provided that the then existing imperial parliament at any demise of the crown, shall not be termined by such demise. In the In the event of the demise of the crown all the members of an existing parliament again take the oath of allegiance. An address of condelence and congratulaion is passed by the parliament to the

reigning sovereign.

As in England so in Canada, parliament was also for a long time formally terminated on the demise of the crown, but the legislature of Canada in 1843 passed an act providing for the continuance of an existing parliament. This was all re-enacted in the first sesion of the Dominion parliament after confederation. Similar legislation now exists in all the provinces of Canada. When the Canadian parliament assembles on Feb. 5, if there is a new oc-cupant of the British throne, it would simply be necessary to substitute the name of the new king in the place of his predecessor upon administering the oath of allegiance to the members of commons, and a similar practice will be followed in the Canadian senate, the members of which will have to take the oath of allegiance to the new king. TYRANNY OF COMPULSION.

Vaccination Still an Open Question-Right to Plant Disease Denied.

In your issue of the 15th inst, I read with - well, with disappointment, that portion of the Governor's message which recommends the Legislature to of the State board of health, and to strengthen its hands by "refusing to restrict any of its

present powers,"
Now, if we accept the interpretation of this law as it is given by the board and a few of its sympathizers, then as it now stands it is clearly defective, the reason it enables one irresponsible man to deliberately trample upon the rights and libertles of citizens, and by his excited cry of wolf, wolf! to precipi-tate a panic, far more harmful than

any condition he seeks to avert. This is not merely a surmise of what might occur, but a statement of what has actually taken place; and when Governor Wells admits, inferentially, there are two sides to the vexed question of vaccination, then a courteous regard for the honest convictions of those who have no faith in it, should promot a more considerate regard for their wishes. His excellency must certainly know that a very large proportion of the people in this State are opposed to vaccination, and that any attempt to make it compulsory will surely be dignantly resented as an unwarranted invasion of their rights. Recognizing the fact that those who

are opposed to any phase of compulsory vaccination are overwhelmingly in the majority in this State, the Legislature should be urgently petitioned to carefully revise the present health law for all the purpose of sustaining or amending it according to their best judgment when viewed in the light of existing

With all due respect to the Governor and to the important office he holds. I for one refuse to yield my right to protect my children.

This question of vaccination—that is, the compulsory part of it—is one that strikes deeper than any question where nerely name, position or money is con-

STATE MEDICAL MATTERS.

The State board of medical examiners has filed its report for the two years ending Dec. 21, 1900, with Governor Wells, which shows that forty-two persons have been examined for the practice of medicine, 38 of whom passed creditably and received certificates.
There were fifty-one applicants to pructice obstetrics, and forty-nine passed a successful examination. The board held ten sessions of two days each duraing the two years.

A recommendation accompanys the report asking that the State law be amended, allowing the board to issue certificates to persons holding proper credentials from other recognized State boards, as there is a movement among the States to do this.


