specifications for a two-story four-room building, planned so as to be ready at any time to be enlarged to an eight-room

any time to be enlarged to an eight-room building, at a cost of \$16,000. Third—That the size of the rooms shall be such that each general school room will accommodate fiftyfive pupils, al-lowing fifteen square feet of floor to each pupil, all buildings to be provided with suitable superintendent's rooms and class

Fourth-That the committee be directed to state that the board reserves the right to accept one or more plans and to reject any or all plans furnished.

The report was discussed at length and adopted with slight amendments.

THE SCHOOL CENSUS.

In the matter of taking the school census this year the committee recommended that the same be taken by blocks, so that the exact population of each by blocks can be determined, with the view of ascertaining the capacity required in each building.

FORM OF BOND ORDERED.
