

BEAUTIFUL EAST INDIA NOBLE WOMAN HERE FOR VISIT.

PRINCESS ENA REACHES MADRID.

On Arriving at Prado Palace She Was Given a Magnificent Ovation.

PATH BESTREWN WITH ROSES

After Entering the Palace King Ordered that Public be Admitted To Grounds.

Madrid, May 25.—The arrival of the future queen of Spain at the Prado palace this evening was the signal for a magnificent ovation, testifying Spain's welcome to her new sovereign. At 6:30 o'clock the royal train reached the outskirts of the palace park. Here a special station had been prepared, consisting of a majestic floral arch, beneath which was suspended a huge wreath of red roses and yellow jonquils. On either side of the arch was a mast bearing British and Spanish banners. Beyond rose a monster arch which had been erected by the people of the neighboring village of Majadahonda. It was without official splendor, but was indicative of the sincerity of the popular feeling.

It was dusk as King Alfonso and Princess Ena entered the royal station. Among them there were the queen mother, the Infantas Isabella, Eulalia and Maria Theresa, Prince Ferdinand, the members of the government and the officials of Madrid.

The queen mother embraced her son and his prospective bride. The party then passed between lines of half-battalions bearing pikes, and, entering the carriage, took up the route to the palace. Princess Ena, with her mother, Princess Henry of Battenberg, and the queen mother occupied the first coach, while King Alfonso, mounted on his horse, galloped alongside, accompanied by Prince Ferdinand and Carlos. Next came the royal horse guard in their white uniforms. Ladies of the Madrid nobility occupied seats along the route, from which they strewn the path of the royal party with flowers. As the party passed Princess Ena acknowledged the act with a wave of her handkerchief.

Enormous crowds of people of Madrid had assembled outside the palace gates, the government giving the freest rein to popular curiosity. The passage of the royal party was greeted with tumultuous cheering and cries of "Long live the queen," "Long live the king and 'Long live Spain.'"

Grouped on the palace portico were the court dignitaries, presenting an imposing spectacle as the royal party entered the palace. After entering the palace King Alfonso directed that the public be admitted to the grounds. The queen, forming a queue along immediately in front of the portico, the king appeared on the upper balcony, holding Princess Ena by his hand. The crowd roared with cheers, but a deep wave of emotion swept over the throng. Princess Ena, with a radiant smile, gave a characteristic English wave of her hand. King Alfonso and the princess appeared on the balcony three times and saluted the people. This democratic beginning has produced a markedly favorable impression on the public, and all Madrid resounds tonight with praise of Princess Ena's character.

The crowd surged outside the palace grounds for hours, acclaiming the future bride. Later in the evening King Alfonso returned to the royal palace. Princess Ena remaining with her mother in the Prado palace until the wedding.

DENVER FRANCHISES.

Quo Warranto Proceedings Brought To Test Them.

Denver, May 25.—Dist. Atty. George A. Strider today brought quo warranto proceedings in the district court against the Denver City Tramway company and the Denver Gas and Electric company to test the validity of the franchises granted these companies at the city election on May 15, on the face of the returns. John T. Holbrook, property owner and secretary of the Colorado Securities company, is plaintiff in record in the cases. It is alleged in the complaints that hundreds of fraudulent votes were counted for the franchises and that they were defeated by at least 300

Four other suits, two quo warranto and two injunctive, are being prepared by the Municipal Ownership league against the same two corporations and will be entered next week, regardless of the action of Dist. Atty. Strider, who holds that such proceedings can be instituted only through him. A contest will also be filed in the county court tomorrow under the election law.

CHILD KILLED IN TORNADO.

Dallas, Tex., May 25.—A special from Waxahachie, Tex., says the residence of J. D. Juke, a farmer living eight miles east of Waxahachie, was struck today by a tornado and demolished. An infant was killed and other members of the family were injured.

HEAVY SNOW IN COLORADO.

Colorado Springs, Colo., May 25.—The storms of the past three days in the mountains west of this city have left Pike's peak with a heavier mantle of snow than has covered this mountain before at this period in the year for a score of seasons.

As the foothills are nearly bare of snow and covered with the spring foliage the effect is particularly striking.

BURTON WILL RESIGN.

Washington, May 25.—Senator Burrows, at an informal meeting of the elections committee today stated that there was no doubt Senator Burton would resign should the supreme court deny his application for a rehearing. Pending the application the committee will make no investigation.

OLD LADY STARTS WALKING.

New York, May 25.—The story of Edward Payson Weston's walk from Philadelphia to New York today led Mrs. Lena Clyman, 75 years old, to leave her daughter's house here with the announcement that she intended to walk to her home at Newport, Ohio. Her relatives have asked the police to search for the old lady.

CASSETT SAILS FOR HOME.

Philadelphia, May 25.—Announcement was made at the Pennsylvania Railroad office in this city that President Cassatt sailed for home from Cherbourg, France, this morning. Mr. Cassatt went abroad for a holiday trip on May 8. It is believed that the revelations made before the interstate commerce commission are responsible for Mr. Cassatt's sudden change of plans. He is expected to reach this country Saturday, June 2.

G. W. PERKINS DISCHARGED.

New York, May 25.—The appellate division of the supreme court today handed down a decision discharging from custody George W. Perkins, whom the supreme court had held to await action of the grand jury on a technical charge of grand larceny in connection with the campaign contributions of the New York Life Insurance company to the Republican national committee.

TWO MURDERERS EXECUTED.

Raton, N. M., May 25.—David Arguello and John Medlock, a negro, were hanged in the jailyard here today.

The crime for which Arguello was hanged was the murder of Francisco Garcia, a deputy sheriff, whom he shot near Raton on Oct. 19, 1905. On July 2, 1904, Arguello murdered Mrs. Celia Dussart, 18 years of age, at Bowen, a coal camp near Trinidad, Colo., because she spurned his attentions. He escaped after a running fight with a posse in the hills. Garcia was attempting to arrest Arguello when the latter shot him. John Medlock shot and killed a colored woman with whom he was living at Gardner, N. M., several years ago. He fled to the Indian Territory, where he attempted to kill another woman, and for this crime he served three years in the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kansas.

SENTENCED TO BE HANGED.

Portland, May 25.—George L. Blodgett, once a resident of Missoula, Mont., was today sentenced to be hanged at the penitentiary at Salem on June 29.

WANT U. S. TROOPS TO DO GUARD DUTY IN FRISCO.

Washington, May 25.—J. R. Byrne of San Francisco was introduced to President Roosevelt by Senator Flint of California.

Mr. Byrne is here to urge the president and secretary of war to permit the United States soldiers to continue to perform guard duty in San Francisco. He told the president that the presence of the soldiers, in the judgment of the people of the city, was an absolute necessity, and expressed the hope that they would not be removed for the present. He said it was practically impossible for the regular police to handle the situation and properly guard the city. The president assured Mr. Byrne that if the people of San Francisco wanted the soldiers to remain on guard they would be permitted to continue there at least for a month or more. Secy. Taft has instructed Maj.-Gen. Greely, in command of the Pacific division, to make arrangements to retain the military forces in charge of relief work in San Francisco until July 1, if such action be necessary.
