FOREIGN.

LONDON, 30.—A dispatch from Athens says: The foreign ministers here on receiving the reply of Greece to the ultimatum of the Powers, referred it to the respective governments from whom they will await instructions before answering.

LONDON, 30.—Gladstone denies the story that he has decided to join the Roman Catholic Church and that he had requested the fact to be kept secret for six months for political purposes.

BERLIN, 2.—The Prussian government, fearing strikes impending, has issued a decree ordering the police to interfere in case strikers intimidate workmen. Extra vigilance is ordered against strikers connected with the social democratic organization, the leaders of which make use of the strike for higher wages to widen the breach between employees and employer in order to increase the workmen's hatred against the existing political and social order, and thus to bring about a great rupture between the laboring classes and their employers. Socialist meetings and publications will be put under energetic surveillance. District governors are authorized to demand troops if necessary for the enforcement of these measures.

ATHENS, 3.—The Greek government has decided that its reply to the ultimatum of the Powers is sufficient, and that the promises contained therein are all it can make. Ministers of the Powers here are preparing to embark to-morrow on the allied fleet. Hopes are entertained in high quarters at Athens that the government at London or St. Petersburg may yet find *modus vivendi* on the Greek question. The resignation of the ministry is impossible.
