There is nothing in the statute to compel me to consult the prosecuting attorney in such instances. Moreover, the county attorney has no authority to dismiss a case, in any case, and assess the costs to the complaining party. It is a matter that lies entirely within the jurisdiction of the court. If any person comes to me with sufficient evidence to show that a crime has been committed, I will issue a warrant without hesitation."

CITY LIGHT AND POWER PLANT

Tannery for Logan—Movement to Close stores at six.

Special Correspondence.

Logan, April 17.—Mayor Hansen and the members of the Logan city council visited the scene of the proposed municipal lighting plant in Logan canyon. The city council is expected to pass the plans of the special committee. All expressed themselves as satisfied with the route of the canal and it was decided that work shall begin forthwith. The canal will be taken out of the river at Crowther's mill, six miles up Logan canyon, and will run two miles west to a point near the Hercules dam. It will be taken out on the south side of the river, flung across the river a short distance below and piped around the face of the mountains to the power house. The pipe will be covered in all the way, and will be a mile and a half heavy fall will give untold power to the water wheel. The route is largely devoid of cliffs, and the expense of excavating will therefore be comparatively light.

Mayor Hansen announces that 25 men with teams will begin work on the canal Monday morning and that the canal will be pushed through as rapidly as possible. It is hoped to have light turned into the city by Oct. 1.
