Cowley, of the Apostles' quorum, addressed the conference. He referred to the keeping of the Sabbath day holy. When the children of Israel were traveing in the wilderness the Lord proaded them with manna, and He commanded that they should only gather enough for one day, but on the day before the Saobath the Lord directed that they gather enough for two days and He blessed it that it was good for them, and thus they were taught to respect the Sabbath day. Today, the speaker said, the Lord does not desire nat we should do so much cooking on sunday, but prepare for Sunday and have lighter foods and attend meeting and Sunday school. Every man bear-ing the Priesthood should be pure in heart, "for blessed are they for they shall see God." In the same sermon shall see God." the Savior said, "Blessed are the peacemakers." Are we peace makers in the wards in which we live? We should be with those who preside over us and make peace among the Saints. If we do not possess these qualities we are not the "salt of the earth." The speaker deplored the course of many of our young men who associate themselves with organizations that are not of us, who become subject to men who are not men of God and thus lose their faith to a certain degree. The Saints were not prepared to obey the law of "consecration", in Missouri, but the Saints will never be redeemed until this iaw can be obeyed. We have the law of tithing, but many of the Saints neglect this duty and do not therefore receive the blessings predicated on that law. We read in section 132, verse 5, the fellowing words: "For all who will have a blessing at my hands, shall abide the law which was appointed for that blessing, and the conditions thereof, as were instituted from before the foundation of the world."

We cannot make a substitute for the laws of God, we must obey the laws if we expect to receive the blessings of the Gospel. We must ablde by these iaws, or evil consequences will follow our transgressions. We should have to overcome the evils of the flesh and abide in the faith. "We thank Thee, O God, for a

#### Tannery for Logan - Movement to Close stores at Six.

Logan, April 17 .- Mayor Hansen and the members of the Logan city coun-cil visited the scene of the proposed municipal lighting plant in Logan can-yon Wednesday, and inspected the Provo. Utah Co., April plans of the special committee. All ex-pressed themseives as satisfied with the canal will be taken out of the river at Crowther's mill, six miles up Logan canyon, and will run two miles west to a point near the Hercules dam. It will taken out on the south side of the river, flumed across the river a short distance below and piped around the face of the mountains to the power house. The pipe will be covered in all the way, and with a two mile run and a heavy fall will give untold power to the water wheel. The route is largely devoid of cliffs, and the expense of excavating will therefore be comparatively slight. Mayor Hansen announces that 25 men with teams will begin work upon
