

PRESIDENT LAYS THIRD TERM GHOST

Makes Definite Declaration Under No Circumstances Will He Accept Nomination.

HE STANDS BY WASHINGTON.

"The Wise Custom Which Limits the President to Two Terms Regards the Substance and Not Form."

Washington, Dec. 11.—President Roosevelt will not be a candidate for a third term. All doubt on this point was tonight dispelled by the authoritative statement from the White House that Mr. Roosevelt still adheres to the declaration of renunciation made on the night of the election three years ago. In the statement issued tonight, President Roosevelt says he has not changed and shall not change the decision delivered to the American people in 1904.

It appears that President Roosevelt had been awaiting the call of the Republican national convention to afford the proper opportunity for making his position clear and unmistakable, thus leaving the field clear for Fairbanks, Taft, Cannon, Knox, Foraker and other declared or receptive candidates for the Republican nomination.

In view of the issuance of the call of the Republican national committee for the convention, the president makes the following statement:

PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT.

"On the night after election I made the following announcement: 'I am deeply sensible of the honor done me by the American people in thus electing their confidence in what I have done and have tried to do. I appreciate to the full the solemn responsibility this confidence imposes upon me, and I shall on all that in my power lies not to forfeit it. On the 4th of March next I shall serve three and a half years and this three and a half years constitute my first term. The wise custom which limits the president to two terms regards the substance and not the form, and under no circumstances will I be a candidate for or accept another nomination.'"

"I have not changed and shall not change the decision thus announced."

CLEAR SITUATION.

The announcement that the president would not accept a third term, came at once to the attention of the public, but among those who learned of it, Democrats and Republicans alike, the feeling was general that it left no element of doubt in the presidential situation so far as relates to the third term talk, and that it definitely eliminates Mr. Roosevelt from the contest now being waged. Some Democrats, however, express a belief that a Roosevelt stampede in the Republican convention would shake his resolution, and that he would prove a precedent to the American citizen ever refused a presidential nomination.

Administration Republicans declare that the announcement gives a great impetus to the Taft boom, while the Democrats, many of the leaders of which party are here to attend the meeting of their national committee tomorrow, are shouting that it means "Bryan in a walk."

REPUBLICAN COMMENTS.

Speaker Cannon when shown the president's statement said: "The president speaks for himself. It would be useless and inappropriate for me to attempt to interpret the president's words."

Senator Foraker, the only other declared candidate who could be seen tonight, said:

"That has been his position all the while, I suppose, but I don't care to discuss the matter, thank you."

Senator LaFollette said:

"While such an announcement could be expected, it was not expected to come so soon. I have no other comment to make at this time."

Senator Hays said:

"There is no question at all about the president's sincerity at this time and before. If conditions should demand his nomination the convention would nominate him and I do not see now it would be possible for him to decline however earnest he might be."

Senator Long of Kansas said:

"The Taft boom will be the only one worth considering after this announcement."

Senator Dick of Ohio: "Nothing else was to be expected."

WHAT DEMOCRATS SAY.

Among the Democrats who commented on the president's statement, was Senator Tillman, who said:

"This is by way of documentary evidence that the president has seen the handwriting on the wall. It means that Bryan will be the next president of the United States. Roosevelt is the only possible Republican candidate who could be considered formidable."

John Sharp Williams, leader of the minority in the house, said:

"I believe I am one of the few Democrats in public life in the country who has been saying all along that the president would not run for a third term. I believed he had too much knowledge of history to run the risk of threatening Republican institutions with perpetuity of tenure in the presidency. I also thought he was a man of so much pride that even if he had come to regret his after-election utterance he would still stand by his word. I think the third term issue would have made Mr. Roosevelt the weakest man in the Republican party. The fact that he is president notwithstanding the fact that he is president in the most popular Republican in the country today."

Former Representative Perry Belmont:

"In case of a deadlock in the Republican convention this declaration would not prevent a stampede resulting in the re-nomination of the president. Whoever the Republican party might elect the country would have a ruler supported by a majority of his party in both the houses. Whomever the Democrats might elect the country would have a president with a strong opposition senate."

Henry G. Davis of West Virginia, former Democratic candidate for vice president:

"The country has been talking that way. The country looks at the question differently now from what it did a few months ago, and the announcement is undoubtedly influenced by the attitude of the country at this time."

Representative Ollie James of Kentucky:

"It is a complete surrender on Roosevelt's part to the corporation element of the Republican party and an announcement in advance of a surrender and the forecasting of the defeat in the national convention of the party for which he stands. This will make Bryan stronger than ever."

Chairman Taggart of the national Democratic committee said:

"I think the public made a mistake before he could make himself believed. It shows that he is the kind of man I thought he was. I think most persons took him at his word the first time, and he is simply showing what a great many persons know—that he is an honest man, and a man of his word."

Representative Hardwick of Georgia:

"I think it means a triumph for the reactionary element in the Republican party and a good chance for the Democrats to win."

Representative Bartlett of Georgia:

"It means a different candidate and a different platform. I think the Republicans will nominate a man on an entirely different platform and put into the platform the things which would not have been put in had Roosevelt stood for the nomination."

NEWS IN NEW YORK.

New York, Dec. 11.—The official announcement from the White House tonight that President Roosevelt would adhere to his earlier determination not to accept a re-nomination, was received with interest, but hardly with surprise, by party leaders here. The president generally has been taken at his word, and those in whose political judgment more confidence is felt had anticipated this evening's statement.

While it was pointed out that the argument that the president might, by sheer force of circumstances, be compelled to accept a third term nomination against his will, was as potent as ever, the consensus of opinion among those seen was that Mr. Roosevelt's clear-cut and decisive language had taken him out of the situation. The suggestion that Mr. Roosevelt could consistently accept a "second elective" term, was disposed of, it was thought, by the president's own words.

It was generally agreed that the elimination of Mr. Roosevelt's name brought that of Gov. Hughes as New York's candidate sharply to the front. Gov. Hughes never has permitted others to speak for him, but Governor Alfred R. Page is probably as close to the governor as anyone is allowed to get. When here last Saturday Senator Page said:

"Without exception the friends of Gov. Hughes are convinced that under no circumstances will he accept a re-nomination for governor. He has made no secret of this, and will have completed the work he was chosen to do. The same qualities, however, which would make him again desirable as a governor would make him undesirable in the office of president."

BRYAN'S COMMENT.

Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 11.—When told tonight that President Roosevelt had made positive declarations that he will not be a candidate for a third term, W. J. Bryan expressed no surprise. He declared the position of the president was as he expected. Mr. Bryan said:

"I have assumed from the beginning that President Roosevelt would not be a candidate. The statement he issued the night of the election, left no room for misunderstanding, and I have felt that his friends were doing him an injustice in suggesting that he would change his position on the subject."

OKLAHOMA SENATORIAL ELECTION CONSUMMATED

Guilford, Okla., Dec. 11.—The election of the first two United States senators from the new state of Oklahoma was consummated late this afternoon by the two houses in joint session in the house of representatives when Speaker W. H. Murray, announcing the vote of yesterday, declared Robert L. Owen of Muskogee, and Thomas P. Lore of Lawton, duly chosen. The vote on the joint ballot was:

Owen and Lore, 87; C. G. Jones and Clarence B. Douglas, the minority nominees, 15. The speaker's announcement was received with an enthusiastic demonstration.

BURNED TO DEATH.

Three Little Children While Parents Were Milking Cows.

Duqueno, Colo., Dec. 11.—Three small children of Antonio Montoya, were burned to death in their home near Iguala, yesterday. The fire resulted from a defective chimney while the parents were milking cows. When they returned they were unable to enter the house which was a mass of flames.

A STATEMENT BY D. F. WALKER

Only Two Months Ago Knew True Condition of Cal. Safe Deposit and Trust Co.

HE WAS ONLY A FIGUREHEAD

Not Active in Bank's Management, and Was a Creditor Not a Debtor to It.

San Francisco, Dec. 11.—Following his arrival from Santa Barbara in the custody of a detective from the local police department, David F. Walker, president of the insolvent California Safe Deposit and Trust company, today gave out a statement in which he declared that not until about two months ago did he become aware of the true state of affairs in the institution over which he presided and whose fate is causing grave anxiety to 12,000 depositors.

Walker, according to his own statement, appears to have been merely a figurehead, as he declared that he had no active part in the conduct of the trust company and the management of its affairs, which, he said, was left in the hands of J. Dabell Brown, the general manager, who at present is occupying a cell in the city prison on the charge of embezzlement, based upon the disappearance of securities valued at \$250,000 belonging to the California state, which had been deposited in the bank by W. J. Barnett, director in the trust company, and until yesterday general counsel and vice president of the Western Pacific railroad, who was the special administrator of the estate.

While neither Walker nor Barnett will state in so many words that Brown is responsible for the disappearance of the securities, the fact that the former has denied all knowledge of their existence, and the latter today stated to the Associated Press that the securities were deposited in the bank by order of the court; that neither he nor Walker had anything to do with their removal, nor at the time that it occurred had any knowledge of it.

THE STATEMENT.

"In my duties as president," said Mr. Walker, "I was at the bank from time to time, but had no active conduct in connection with the management of the affairs of the bank. Those all remained in the hands of Mr. Brown, who had been connected with the bank prior to my becoming its president."

"On the eighth day of June, 1907, I again went east on business in connection with the San Francisco Bond and Mortgage company. The first I knew of any weakness in connection with the bank was the receipt of telegraphic information from San Francisco that the bank had closed its doors. During the next days immediately preceding this information, I received letters from Mr. Brown to the effect that the business of the bank and its branches was in a flourishing condition and that in spite of the financial crisis, the institution was doing well."

"I know nothing whatever regarding the Colton securities. I have never seen the securities, and I never had possession of them in any form."

THE BANK'S CREDITOR.

"I am not a debtor to the bank in the sum of \$250,000 or in any other amount. On the contrary, at the time when the bank closed I was a creditor of the bank in the sum of about \$42,000, and Mr. Walker was also a creditor."

"I am now at a time, and have told them fully and frankly everything that I know in connection with the securities of that estate, and I am ready at any time to extend to them, and to every one, such aid as I can in obtaining full information regarding the affairs of the bank."

Asst. Dist. Atty. Cook stated this afternoon that the two men he had set to work examining the books of the bank had gathered much information about its affairs and methods, but the nature of which he declined to give out.

Gov. Gillett, was in conference with Bank Commissioners Lynch and Sherer during the day with reference to the financial situation and the duties of the commission. Later in the day the commission took charge of the Citizens' State bank, a small institution on Fillmore street, which suspended several weeks ago. R. E. Radland is the president and principal shareholder in the institution. The commissioners found that the bank had \$5,000 in its vaults, as against \$90,000 owed to depositors. Its principal asset were notes for \$90,000.

He was waylaid and stoned to death near Topia, Mexico, by a gang of Mexican miners in his employ, on Dec. 1. Because of the financial stringency, Boggs was unable to pay his men their wages.
