Up to date the factory has received over 46,000 tons of beets and have sliced at the central plant and the have sliced at the contrast, 600 tons and three auxiliaries about \$4,000 tons and have manufactured into white granu-lated sugar 78,410 bags or 7,841,000 pounds. The sugar contents this season is excellent and there will only be a very small per cent of the entire acreage that will not reach the requirement of the contract. The yield per acre is averaging about twelve tons,

which is considered very good and the farmers generally speaking are feeling quite jubiliant. The factory under the superintendency of Mr. Jas H. Gardsuperintendency of Mr. Jas H. Gard-ner is running very smoothly slicing on an average of 1,000 tons of beets and manufacturing over 2,500 bags per day of white granulated sugar. Quite often the amount of sugar made per day ex-ceeds this number; Monday last 2,900 bags were sacked in twenty-four hours.

SHOCKING SUICIDE.

Herman Dalgren, a Stranger, Shoots Himself-Beet Harvest Hindered. Special Correspondence.

Willard, Boxelder Co., Oct. 29 .- Last Sunday night about 9:45 the report of a pistol and the failing of a heavy body in an upper room of the Warner boarding house, which was occupied by a translent who had sought lodgings for the night, struck the inmates with alarm, and upon investigation be-

ing made it was found that the lodger had, no doubt with full intent of committing suicide, taken a 38-caliber Smith & Wesson revolver, and sent a bullet through his heaft. His lifeless body was found lying upon the floor, having fallen from the chair upon which he had sat when he fired the fatal shot into his breast.
