The Waterford Daily Mail says: A company of farmers and laborers to the number of 600, assembled on the 27th of last month at the Slieverne coal fields, and dug down to the extent of four feet, when they found several specimens of coal, which geologists regard as identical with what is called the Old Newport coals.
