STRIKE IS RICHER.

Recent Find in South Columbus Con. Grows Bigger Steadily.

From the South Columbus Con-From the South Columbus Concomes the word that the strike made weeks ago in a winze from the Quincy tunnel is not only holding out big but that the stuff is growing richer with each week's work. The winze is being sunk in five feet of ore. A sample taken out to prove up the poor looking rock in the vein brought the surprising returns of 68.8 per cent copper and 65 ounces in silver. The rock carries some iron. This ore body has been followed for a distance of 100 feet and it has been noticed that the copper values are increasing steadily. Although the winze is just a foot below the level of the tunnel the ore is a foot wider. The stuff is worth over \$300 at ton, takes a high polish, is as heavy as lead and, according to Tony Jacobson, will prove a wonder should it grow bigger and richer, as it threatens to do. The same ore body is to be cut 160 feet lower by the lower tunnel.

#### LUCIN MINES FORMED.

Butte Operators Become Interested in Box Elder County Copper Deposits.

The Mines Exploration company of Butte is organizing the Lucin Copper Mines company, capitalized for \$1,500.7,000, to operate copper mines in that district. The property consists of 25 full mining claims in the Lucin district, Box Elder county, Utuh, seven miles from the smelter at Tecoma, Nevada.
