When brought up to the police station the young man took the situation cooly and seemd not in the least concerned. He said that Mortensen had paid them checks one for 518 and the other for \$20, and that when the checks were presented at the bank for payment they were not honored and were informed that they were worth-less. Mortensen had no money in the bank. Powell said he was anxious to get for it but did not find him how. An ordinance levying a tax and for the assessment of property abutting on the east side of Sixth East from Second South street northward 495 feet, to defray the expense of constructing a sover thereon. Be it ordained by the city council of Salt Lake City, Utah:

Section 1.-That said city council doth hereby levy a tax upon the pro-perty hereafter described abutting an the east side of Sixth East street from Second South street northward 495 feet in Sewer District No. 1, to defray the expense of constructing a sawer upon said street opposite said property hereinafter described to be especially af-fected and benefited by said improvement; and it is hereby adjudged, determined and established that the same will be especially benefited by said imwill be especially benefited by said im-provement to the full snioutt of the tax hereby leved and the same is here-by assessed at an equal and uniform rate in accordance with the linear foot frontage upon said street.
