

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRICAL.**—Boucault's "Jessie Brown" was produced yesterday to a good house, the acting throughout was excellent. Miss Adams as Jessie Brown was the centre of attraction and played the part well. The drama will be repeated to-night. To-morrow evening Miss Anne Lockhart from the California and Australian theatres will make her first appearance; and has selected the character of "Parthenia," in the beautiful play of "Ingomar." Miss Lockhart received very favorable notice from the journals during her sojourn in California, all having spoken of her in the highest terms. The part of "Parthenia" is a good test part for an excellent actress.

**POLICE.**—Patrick McCormie for being drunk and disturbing the peace paid a fine of \$10. George Hess came under the ordinance concerning drunkenness, and also paid \$10. Frank Sanceles was another "drunk," and had a fine of \$10 assessed against him.

**A GOOD WORK.**—The City have had men at work yesterday and to-day improving the crossing from the east side of the Theatre south. Pedestrians in that locality can appreciate the work; and theatre-goers on muddy evenings will enjoy the benefit of it.

**STORMING.**—After the storm comes sunshine. After the rain of last night and the snow of this morning, the sun burst forth with full spring strength, and the sludge and mud consequent upon the downward pouring of its rays has been terrible on "patens leathers" and other pedal coverings.

The Saints, so far as I am acquainted, are enjoying the blessing of health and strength, and almost without exception have all the work or more than they wish to do. The hand of the Lord in their behalf is so obvious that none can ignore His kindness. The spirit of the work is enjoyed; and baptisms are of daily occurrence."

**ECHO CITY.**—Our special from Echo informs us that two men were garrotted on Friday night, one had \$15 taken from him, and another named Godfrey, from this city, was robbed of \$150. The officers were after them soon, and three men were secured. The gamblers proposed to hang them right straight, but Justice Livingston objected that. He was there to maintain law and order. Those who believe in living according to railroad "civilization" begin to feel that there is something in the climate of Utah very uncongenial to their proclivities.

LEGISLATIVE.

**COUNCIL.**—Mr. Hyde, chairman of committee on Petitions and Memorials, to whom was referred the House memorial to Congress, asking that the net proceeds of the Internal Revenue of Utah Territory, be set aside for the erection of a penitentiary, reported the same back amended and recommended its adoption. The memorial was read as amended, and on motion of Mr. E. Snow was concurred in as amended, and sent to the House for concurrence.

**HOUSE.**—The House met at 10 a. m. A communication was received from David O. Calder, Chancellor pro tem of the Deseret University, stating that the sum of \$4,896.35 of last year's appropriation had been expended in building "First and Second Readers," and that other works were in hand, and nearly completed.

Mr. Rockwood presented a proposition from Mr. Brinze, the proprietor of the Weber bridge at Wanship, which was read and laid on the table till called for.

Mr. George Taylor presented a petition from F. Olson and 65 others, citizens of Springtown, Sanpete Co., with accompanying bill for a charter for said city, which was read and referred.

Mr. Rockwood presented a supplementary report of the Superintendent of the Salt Lake City and Wanship wagon road.

The Committee on Roads, etc., were instructed to inquire into the facts in relation to a toll gate having been established on the public highway running East and near Yellow Creek, and to report at an early day.

The Committee on Claims and Appropriations were instructed to insert in the Appropriation bill the sum of \$236, for desk, stationery and postage for the Auditor's office.

The Committee on Judiciary reported back "an Act pertaining to damage done by animals," with amendments, and recommended its passage; and reported adversely to the passage of "an Act supplementary to an act entitled 'an Act regulating the manufacture and sale or other disposal of intoxicating liquors.'"

An Act pertaining to damage done by animals was taken up as amended, and passed its second reading, as amended, and House took a recess till 2 p. m.
