Can Their Summits be Seen from Each Other?

Redding, Cal., July 29 .- It is believed that the question of whether the summits of Mount Hood in Oregon and Mount Shasta, are visible from each Mount Shasta, are visible from each other, will be determined Monday next through the efforts of the Portland Ma-zamas. Thirteen members of that or-ganization arrived in Sisson from Portland today prepared to climb Mount Shasta and prepare for experi-ments Monday. Sun flashes will be made from the tops of two peaks throughout Monday afterroon. That night the crowd on Mount Shasta will burn 16 pounds of red flash powder at burn 10 pounds of red flash powder at exactly 9:30 o'clock. If the whichers on the summit of Mount Hood see the fire they will reply by setting off red fire five minutes later. If not they will wait until 9.45 o'clock and set off 10 pounds of red fire in the hope that it will be seen on Shasta summit.

World's Fair Loan Rumors.

St. Louis, July 29.-A rumor became current today that the world's fair management was negotiating for a loan of \$1,000,000 from various financial institutions of St. Louis. President D. R, Francis made the following state-ment to the Associated Press;

"The exposition company does not owe one dollar to any financial institu-tion in St. Louis or elsewhere, nor has it borrowed any money since it pro-cured from the federal government the lean of \$4,600,000 in February last. To provide for emergencies, however, nego-tistions have been had with some of the banks and trust companies of the the banks and trust companies of the city and the option of the loan to the extent of \$1,000,000. In the event it should be required has been secured. The collateral that will be given for this loan, if taken, will be very accept-able to the financial institutions."
