MT. PLEASANT, March 24, 1876.

His wife died the year previous. He belonged to the High Priests' Quorum, and his course through life has ever been exemplary, one of kindness and good will to all his posterity number 24 children, grand and great grand children. Thus he passed away from this life, one of the veterans of the Church of Christ, leaving a posterity to revivify his name and follow in the path he has marked for them, and the example he has set them.—[Com.]
