#### An unal Championship Games Will Come Off a Week Later.

Chicago, March 14 .- The managing committee of the inter-collegiate track meet of the western conference schools s considering the advisability of holding the annual championship games a week later than usual this year in order not to conflict with the champion ship meet to be held in connection with the Pan-American exposition at Buf-falo. A number of western schools wish to send teams to compete in the nation-al contests. Chicago, Michigan and Wisconsin have already expressed their lesire to enter teams. In order to give these a chance without interfering with the annual games the meet will probably be set a week later, June 1

In the contests at Buffalo the best athletes from the leading schools will compete so that the meet will be a test between the East and West. A plan has been suggested for select-
