## CROPS ARE NOT GREATLY DAMAGED

Secy. of Agriculture Wilson Says That Reports on Matter Have Been Much Exaggerated.

SPRING SEEDING BACKWARD.

"I Can State That I Never in My Life Save Brighter Prospects Than These of the Present."

Chicago, May 6,-The reports of dam . age to the crops which have been so numerous of late, owing to the unaca sonable weather and the rayages of bugs, have been greatly exaggerated, according to James Wilson, secretary of agriculture, who is in Chicago to-

"Spring seeing is a little backward," he said, "on account of the cold weather, but there is plenty of time between now and the last of September to grow a crop of all kinds of grain. In Minne sota and the Dakotas, where we see most of our spring wheat, seeding has been delayed about two weeks, but with a few days of warm sunshine planting will be in full progress. While the weather has been unseasonably cold in some districts, it has not been severe enough to retard plowing, and my advices are that the ground in these states has been nearly all made feady to receive the seed. We will have warm vices are that the ground in these states has been nearly all made ready to receive the seed. We will have warm weather in a few days now, and I don't see what is to prevent a normal crop of spring wheat in these states.

"As regards the Canadian northwest, the claims being made that this year's harvest will be seriously diminished may have some foundation. According to what I consider authentic advices from that section, the weather has been so cold that plowing has been almost impossible. In past years the Canadian farmer has generally left his plowing for the spring, and this year he finds himself in a bad predicament. In a normal year seeding would be about finished in Manitoba and adjoning provinces, but I am told that today the farmers there have not got the ground ready for receiving the seed if the weather was favorable for this work. However, such a condition in the Canadian northwest won't make a great deal of difference when this year's crop is harvested. The Canadian farmer grows but a small proportion of the total crop of wheat, and I am of the opinion that the deficiency there, if there be any, will hardly be noticed which harvesting throughout the world has been completed.

"In the southwest there have been numerous reports for the past three weeks of damage being wrought by green bugs. These reports of damage to the winter wheat have been greatly exaggerated. I am in a position where I get as good information as anybody regarding the crops. While I have had many reports about the green bug, These reports of damage to the winter wheat have been greatly exaggerated. While I have had many reports about the green bug, the damage wrought by these insects has been local in every instance, and there has not been any general attack by this pext, as some people are endeavoring to make it appear. From my knowledge of the southwest, where so much of our winter wheat is grown, the deficient will have its usual

my knowledge of the southwest, where so much of our winter wheat is grown, the advices at hand lead me to believe that the district will have its usual crop this year. This applies to oats and corn as well as wheat. The crops, as a whole, may be delayed somewhat in ripening, but not enough to cause any apprehension. Corn will suffer most, as ploughing for this crop has been delayed considerably, but I see no cause for apprehension.

"There is considerable grain grown between Washington and Chicago, and from my personal observation of this part of the United States, I can state, without any reservation, that I never in my life saw brighter prospects than those of the present. Taken as a whole,

### GREAT STORM IN TEXAS.

## DEFRAUDING THE GOVERNMENT

DEFENDANT PLEADS GUILTY.

## FRANCO-JAPANESE UNDERSTANDING

Established 1850

Will Mutually Guarantee Political And Commercial Interests of Two Powers in Far East.

GERMANY BEING ISOLATED.

New Grouping of Nations in Orient Emphasizes in Significant Way Great Britain's Maneuvering.

Paris, May 6.—Official confirmation has been obtained by the Associated Press of the report that negotiations are in progress betwees France and Japan looking to an understanding mutually guaranteeing the political and toally guaranteeing the political and commercial interests of the two powers in the far east. Harmonious conferences on the subject have been going on at Tokio. France has recognized that her possessions in Indo-China and Siam, as well as her commercial interests in the far east, would be extremely vulnerable in the event of war, and deemed it wise to make an arrangement with Japan, which is willing to guarantee French interests in return for the recognition of the

willing to guarantee French interests in return for the recognition of the Japanese claims in Korea.

At the same time it is explained the entente will be strictly limited to the maintenance of the status quo. It does not touch China and has not anything resembling an offensive or defensive feature. Nevertheless, taken in connection with the Russo-Japanese understanding, which shortly will be concluded, and the Anglo-Japanese and Franco-Russian alliances, the entente Franco-Russian alliances, the entente creates a combination in the far east and a new grouping of the powers in Europe of extreme significance. It constitutes, in effect, in another significant way Great Britain's diplomatic maneuvering for the isolation of Germany.

It is learned that the recent Japanese loan floated in Paris and London was involved in the negotiations, and that Great Britain and Russia already have approved the general lines of the arrangement. rangement.

QUADRUPLE ALLIANCE. London, May 6.—Great Britain has been advised that France and Japan are carrying on negotiations with the view of reaching an understanding pro-viding for the maintenance of the status quo in the far east so fas as

those nations are concerned.

The discussions have shown that
France and Japan hold the same views with respect to China. While the agreement will not go so far as the Auglo-Japanese treaty, it will remove any existing uneasiness regarding the security of the French possessions in the far east. The new Russo-Japanese treaty will, it is also believed, embody similar features, so four nations will soon have practically entered into a similar understanding not to inter-fere with each other's interests in the
