

## THE PRODUCE MARKET.

Wheat Continues in Good Demand with Prices Firm.

## CORN DECLINES IN THE EAST.

The Exportation of Old Potatoes has Stopped.

The stormy weather during the past week has steadily diminished the rush of business to a slight extent, but all lines still keep going. Wholesale dry-goods merchants report an excellent spring trade. Wholesale grocers and hardware merchants have all they can do to fill their orders of shipments to the country. It is still a daily occurrence for teams to be fitting out for the Deep Creek mines, while the old reliable camps of Laramie, Park and Bighorn are being worked to almost their full capacity. The Overland stage company running from Rockwood and Deep Creek reports no mail travel; they have all they can do to take care of their passenger business, some 200 to 300 cars which have left our territory within the last forty days, being large amounts of bags, the payment for which has been received by our contractors, which enables them to pay up the jobsites here in the city, and they are doing so promptly with increased orders for spring and summer trade. The storms and sunshine that we have had during the past week have been excellent for growing. All parts of the territory, report the grain crops in excellent condition with prospects for fruit and vegetables better than any time for many years past. This should create for us a large export instead of import trade this summer and fall. The banks report the money market in good condition with money somewhat easier than last year. The grain market shows a large increase of tonnage, both in and out of the territory, while the demand for grain is such that shippers cannot fill their orders. All little articles, such as household working wares need to be on our streets.

## OFFERS.

**Wheat**—The demand for this article still holds good, both for import and home trade with prime firms. Holders are not inclined to sell. Offerings have been made from \$1 to \$1.50 per bushel, both in and out of the territory.

**Corn**—Corn is somewhat easier than it has been for the last thirty days with a slight decline reported from the eastern markets, but very little importation is being done in the western markets. Some little corn has been offered at \$0.15 to \$0.20 per bushel, while very little transactions are being done at present.

**Sugar**—The demand for sugar has eased up in the eastern markets. The advance in price threw the trade into balance and should be temporary. **Dye**—The demand for dye has eased up in the eastern markets. The advance in price threw the trade into balance and should be temporary. **Flour**—The supply will continue very light and not yet equal to the demand. The price is firm, ranging from Utah selling from \$5.10 to \$6.00 per cwt. and eastern from \$4.75 to \$5.00. All goods must be paid and guaranteed at the above prices.

**Hemp**—Hemp continues plentiful, with heavy shipments arriving both from east and west which has to a certain extent cut down orders for California stock. Local shippers from this state are offering to sell at \$1.00 per bushel, with stock on hand increasing, which is bound to make a decline in price as every individual is anxious to get rid of his surplus. The market is being overstocked. Offerings for California last at \$2.00 per pound, eastern commodity from 22 to 25, distroy from 22 to 25, Utah good stock is selling from 22 to 25, and oil or oil cake from 22 to 25.

**Potatoes**—The demand for old stock for exportation has entirely stopped, with no market at present, except for small quantities offered at \$0.10 to \$0.15 per bushel, sacked, while new California stock is offered at \$0.10 and over.

**Provisions**—The stormy weather has made prices run on meat with an advance during the past week of from 25 to 50 per cent.; offerings are made today for structures at \$2.25, charoies at \$0.50 to \$1.75, oranges are firm at \$2.00 to \$2.50 per case, and Salt Lake Price Current.

## Probate Court.
