## **LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.**

How to Keep Christmas.—The holidays are approaching. No man who can afford it should be contented with less than two Christmas dinners; one for himself and one for somebody else who would otherwise be without a feast. Every citizen who is comfortably situated should remember his poor neighbor this season.

The case will be heard before Justice Peyer.

Disgraceful Fracas.—Last week a disgraceful fracas occurred in Beaver between some soldiers and a few of our young men, resulting in several being severely injured on both sides. The assaulting party were the Fort Camerons, who demanded admission to a dance that was being held, and being denied, raised the row. The city marshal through lack of aid, only succeeded in capturing two of the belligerents, one of them being a soldier, only one of them being a soldier.

In for the Winter.—We were pleased to receive a call to-day from Brother Joseph A. West, who has been engaged surveying on the Utah and Western Railroad. The party of which he had charge have ceased operations for the season, and will disband for the winter. In his field operations Brother West reached a point about four hundred miles south-west of this city. He will continue his connection with the company, and in the meantime be engaged in working up his field notes. Tracking along on the line is still in progress, about fifteen miles being now down.

Too Many Poles.—Perhaps it has occurred to a good many of our citizens that the spacious streets of our city are being overrun and greatly disfigured by the erection of a large number of unsightly poles. In the course of time the nuisance will become so glaring that our city fathers will be compelled to take cognizance of it, and restrain or prohibit further encroachments. It is a matter that needs notice now. What makes the subject more disagreeable conspicuous than it would otherwise be, is the unsightly character of the poles with which the streets are being lined. Nobody would be so far from taking to a sense of the beautiful as to call them ornamental. Many of them are, to use a common phrase, as crooked as a dog's hind leg, and the proprietors have not even taken the trouble to denude them of the rough bark.

It is evident that the multiplication of telephone and electric light connections will, in course of time, necessitate some other arrangements than those now existing, and the earlier the change the less difficulty will be met with in inaugurating it. Many of the poles could be placed at the rear of buildings in place of in the public thoroughfares. In any case when it is necessary to place poles upon the streets they should at least be of respectable appearance.

It is not desirable that our city should be given the appearance of a Liverpool dock, by an elaborate display of masts, minus the bunting.

## **THE INDIAN MURDER.**

FULL PARTICULARS OF THE KILLING OF INDIAN JIM AND WOUNDING OF HIS WIFE.

Yesterday Indian Interpreter Geo. W. Hill took a run out west, on horseback, to obtain reliable particulars regarding the killing of an Indian and wounding of a squaw, near Jordan Bridge, on Friday night. We are therefore, through his courtesy, now enabled to give the whole story.  
 Last Friday, No-ve, otherwise known as Jim, purchased three bottles of whisky from a saloon keeper in this city, and took the stuff to camp. He offered some to Mone, and insisted on the latter finishing one bottle. Both got very drunk, and, as a matter of course, exceedingly quarrelsome. Both were worked up to a pitch of great fury, when Mone drew his butcher knife and plunged it into Jim's side, between the ribs, the wounded man falling to the ground, the blood flowing in a copious stream from the fearful gash.  
 Jim's wife reeled Mone by one arm while a young squaw grasped the other, and a desperate struggle ensued between the infuriated Indian and the two women. In his endeavor to free himself Mone slashed his knife around the arm of Jim's wife, above the elbow, cutting a long wound half around the limb, the blade going close to the bone. The wounded woman was compelled then to leave go her hold. The other squaw, fearing that she would be served similarly, also released her hold upon the murderer and retreated.  
 As soon as he was free Mone made his escape, proceeded to the house of interpreter Hill, as previously published, and told a lying story about Jim threatening to kill him that night, he having, by that time, already given Jim his death wound.  
 Poor Jim was still living on Saturday morning, but the next day he was gradually growing dim, and he and his companions were conscious that the light must entirely go out inside of a few hours. Arrangements were made to take him to the Salt Lake, where he would be placed on a horse and taken to Mountain, to be interred. "Put me on my horse and take me easy," said he, and so they did. He lived till he reached Grantsville, on the afternoon of Saturday, when he expired.

## **FATAL ACCIDENT NEAR KAYSVILLE.**

THOMAS BARNETT MEETS HIS DEATH BY BEING RUN OVER IN A WELL.

Reliable information has just come to hand that a young man by the name of Thomas Barnett, aged 28 years, son of James and Mary Barnett, of Kaysville Ward, was, yesterday afternoon, killed on the Sand Ridge, north of that town, by the caving in of a well which he and others were digging. He was working at a depth of between 40 and 45 feet, when the earth fell in upon him.  
 Up to 8 o'clock last night his body had not been recovered, notwithstanding the strenuous efforts of from 10 to 15 persons to reach him.  
 He was an exemplary young man and formerly resided in the 17th Ward of this city, and leaves a wife and two small children and his aged parents to mourn his untimely end.  
 Later.—We have now learned that, after much exertion, the body was extricated from the excavation at eleven o'clock last night. Much difficulty was experienced in the matter by the continual falling in of the sandy earth, making the labor of getting at the body dangerous as well as laborious.

## **A Violent Assault.—**A party giving the name of Jeff Dodge and a companion named Dan McGinley, were drunk last night. The first named individual was belligerent. On the sidewalk near Godbe's corner he pushed a boy about roughly. Young "Ike" Hunter remonstrated with him, when he drew a revolver and struck Hunter over the head with it.

The police arrested both Dodge and McGinley, and this morning the former was fined \$40 and the latter \$10. They both claim to hail from Colorado, but the police are of opinion that Dodge hails from the penitentiary. Both are rough characters.

## **A Good Portrait.—**We have been shown a very fine life-size portrait in oil, of the late respected Apostle Orson Pratt. It is fresh from the brush of his son Lorenz. We must congratulate the young artist on the remarkably rapid progress he has made, as exhibited in this last specimen of his handiwork. The likeness is strikingly faithful, one of its chief charms being the retention of the thoughtful, intelligent expression peculiar to the subject. The portrait is to be hung up in President Taylor's office, to which it was taken to-day.

As Usual.—The usual runaway occurred at three o'clock this afternoon. It rushed east along First South Street, thence south down the State Road, then west on Second South Street to Walker's corner, where the wagon collided with the drinking fountain, tearing it completely out of the ground. It also struck a lamp post, knocking it partially over. A little boy was also knocked down. He was carried into an adjacent drug store. We did not learn the extent of his injuries, but it was thought his leg was broken.

Burglary.—The house of a Swedish family, on Plum Street, near Commercial Street, was entered burglariously last night. The thieves entered by getting upon a back porch by means of a ladder. They opened a bureau and carried off a quantity of underclothing. Some of the articles taken from the house were found by the police upon the street close to the house.

The Opening.—A large crowd filled Dryer's establishment last night on the occasion of the grand opening. The scene was brilliant, the display surpassing that of any former season. The store has been thronged to-day with sight seers and purchasers, and will be likely to continue crowded throughout the holidays.

## **Out His Throat.—**The Ploche Record of last Saturday says:

"A man, who had been on a spree several days out at Jackabell, came to Ploche last Saturday afternoon, accompanied by his friend Jim Jama. On Sunday morning he appeared at Smith's corral with a gash in his throat and procured some water, and then disappeared until Wednesday evening, when he came and got his blankets. On Thursday he went to the corral after more water, and Mr. Smith watched where he went, then came up town and reported. The man was brought up town and placed under the care of Dr. Matthews. The wound in his throat, the man first cut on one side of his throat, then on the other, merely cutting through the skin, and then jabbing the knife into his throat, inflicting a deep wound. The windpipe and esophagus is out, and when he drinks, the water comes out of the wound. On Friday, the doctor probed the wound back to the spinal column, but the man commenced vomiting, compelling him to cease. Although it is a severe wound, it is not necessarily fatal. The man's name is William Hanly."
