MEETINGS AT THE TABERNACLE tomorrow, at ten and two o'clock, and in the various ward meeting rooms in the evening.

"THE SEVEN SISTERS."—Last night the extravaganza of the "Seven Sisters" was performed at the Tabernacle, with great success, the various roles being excellently rendered. Mr. Chaplin, as Madame Pluto, showed himself to be no mean comedian, and as the German burly-gurdy woman, and the Irish apple seller made any amount of fun, while "Tartarini," Miss Walters when personating the "Yankee gal," and singing "Away Down in Maine," kept the house in a perfect roar. This play is an excellent versatile actress, and we think her performance last night excelled anything she has heretofore attempted.

Mr. Harris gave a capital delineation of "Cuffee," and his stump speech was encouraged.

Mr. Thorne's "Pluto" was very good, as also the characters sustained by Messrs. Marden, Wilton, Misses Clawson, Jones and others.

The "Seven Sisters" will be repeated tonight, and if you want to see some fine acting and to have a hearty laugh go and see Chaplin and Miss Walters.

Miss ADA GRAY, next Monday, appears on the Salt Lake stage as "Cora Delaford," the heroine in the powerful and celebrated play "Article 47," an adaptation of a French play of the Camille school. Miss Gray has been playing in California, and the Golden Era speaks of her and "Article 47" in the following terms:—

Eastern papers have spoken well of this lady but we did not know exactly how exaggerated. Miss Gray is a handsome woman and a superior actress. In natural qualities she excels many whose names are better known. Her person is commanding, countenance expressive, and bearing graceful and majestic. Her voice is clear, bell-like in tone, sweet and penetrating and of volume to fill the largest theatre in the Union. The first act of "Article 47" did not give the star much chance in the second act she meets the man who first ruined her and who she has ruined in turn, and the interview is splendid. Miss Gray rose at once to the situation and showed the position of the man who was a superb, her tone and manner of expression just what the text required. Her transition from indignation to supplication, from scorn to tenderness, from threats to pleading, was so natural that it seemed possible for a real woman's heart to be torn by such contending emotions. But this scene was but a prelude in point of acting to the mad scene in the third act. To realize its thrilling intensity one must have been closeted with an interesting mad woman for a few hours. If the energy of her denunciation was terrible, the pathos of her supplication was as touching. As a piece of acting we can compare it to nothing we remember her to have done in the mad scene of "Lady Audley's Secret."

"Article 47" was continued through the week to a succession of crowded houses. The play has been a decided success.

The Circus last evening was filled to overflowing by a delighted and appreciative audience. Of the many that have visited this city we can safely say the present one of Conklin Bros. offers the most varied and entertaining performance of any.

The performances of the Morosetti Brothers in their tumbling, horizontal bar and trapeze exercises were indeed very good, the latter being especially skilled and daring. Mr. Woody Cook, in his summersault riding, showed a degree of skill seldom looked for in one so young.

Mr. John Conklin, the modern Hercules and cannon ball performer, astonished every one present, the rapidly and easily which he handled those 32 and 65 pounders were beyond all anticipation, they seemed to be no more in his hands than a ball in the hands of a school boy.

The lady rider was charming and graceful. Mr. Pete Conklin as clown was indeed a treat for it is so seldom we find a man capable to sustain that character in the traveling shows. His educated point is a quite feature, while his elephant in the most lively thing imaginable. Mr. William Warner, clown and Dutch comedian, appeared to advantage. Professor Samuels equestrian juggling was very skillful but the greatest feature of the entertainment is his troupe of trained dogs and monkeys, with his equestrian goat and clown dog. His ship rides with considerable ease and grace, while the acts of the clown dog keep the audience in a perpetual roar of laughter.

Their acts so skillfully and neatly made, reflect great credit on Professor Samuels as a trainer. Other gentlemen of the troupe acquitted themselves in a very creditable and artistic manner.

The troupe perform again this evening, on Monday afternoon, and again for the last time on Monday evening.

In addition to the evening performance on Monday, a musical will be given on the afternoon of that day. This will present an excellent opportunity for ladies and children unable to attend the evening, to see the excellent entertainment offered by this establishment.
