LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS

Discharged.—The examination, yesterday afternoon, of Brightmore, the man charged with the theft of an overcoat, resulted in the discharge of the prisoner, as no witness appeared to testify against him.

Hook and Ladder.—The regular monthly meeting of the above company takes place tomorrow evening, at 7:30, in the Fireman's Hall. A full attendance is desired.

From the South.—James Robbins, Esq., the enterprising store-keeper of the south, is up to the city for a few days, on business. Mr. Robbins is running two mercantile houses, one in Gunnison, Sanpete County, the other in Salina, Sevier County, and is a five business man.

A Child Baster.—Charles Morris, the individual who figured prominently in the child-battering affair last fall, and who was indicted and arrested for the crime shortly afterward, has been up for trial in the District Court. Yesterday, a motion made by the defendant's attorney, for defendant's release, at his own recognition, was overruled by the Court and the case was set for March 5d, at which time it will be tried.

At It Again.—John Sageron was charged by the police magistrate this afternoon with drunkenness and disturbance and with resisting the officer who arrested him for that offense. For drunkenness and disturbance he was fined \$10, for resisting \$50. Sageron is one of the late convicts paroled out of the Penitentiary, by the Governor, for good behavior while there. Ah, John, if it is only in prison that you can behave yourself, it may be that you will find yourself inside the big wall again ere long.

"Junction" Jots.—We understand that an Ogden company have been offered \$150 per ton by an Omaha firm for all the ore they wish to deliver at that place from a certain mine about 1 1/2 miles north of this city.

Yesterday's Union Pacific train brought in from Devil's Gate two "telescoped" flat cars, both loaded with coal. The hind flat had been driven half way on the forward one, making the look, knocking out the end gate, and driving the front truck toward the center of the flat. The "telescoping" was caused by a recent snowdrift.

Last evening, at about a quarter to seven o'clock, the Utah and Northern passenger train, which was due two days since came steaming into the depot. The company have used every endeavor to keep the road clear, and get their train in on time, and have been successful until the last heavy fall of snow. However, it is thought no more difficulty will be encountered.

Home Silk Manufacture.—The Utah Silk Association has in contemplation the erection of a building and the introduction of the necessary machinery to work up the raw silk produced in our Territory, thus making and putting upon the market home manufactured silk goods. The site chosen for the factory is the old saw mill at the mouth of City Creek Cañon. The building is to be constructed of brick, it will stand a little to the southeast of the saw mill, and its machinery will be run by belts connecting with the water wheel of the saw mill. The work of breaking the ground and making the necessary excavation will commence as early as the weather will permit. This is a commendable movement on the part of the Association, and shows that it means business, and possesses the necessary life and vigor to make the enterprise a success. We shall watch with much interest, as everyone will, the furtherance of this worthy home industry, which has our earnest and best wishes for its success and prosperity.

Weather Report

Springville.—Very cold, blowing, some snow.

Provo.—Cold, windy and cloudy. Payson.—Cold, cloudy, snowed about four inches last night.

Silver City.—Cold, wind blowing hard from north-west, no snow. Nephi.—Snowed about four inches last night, is still snowing and now blowing and drifting hard, very cold.

Fillmore.—Snowing and wind blowing, about seven inches snow fell last night and this morning. Cove Creek.—Snowing, blowing hard, about two inches new snow.

Beaver.—Snowing, hard wind from north, about an inch new snow. Lodi.—It has been blowing and snowing all night and still storming. Santaquin.—Snow fell last night eight inches, and is snowing very hard now.

Price.—Snowing, blowing, about one inch new snow. Minersville.—Snowing and blowing. Parowan.—Snowing now, snow now about a foot deep.

Cedar City.—Cold, just commenced snowing, looks like big storm coming. Tropic.—Snowing, blowing, about two inches new snow.

Toquerville.—Cool and hazy. Silver Reef.—Cloudy and windy. St. George.—Warm and pleasant, few clouds around, roads good.

Hebron.—Cloudy, but warm, thawing very fast, snow mostly gone. Panaca, Nev.—Clear, wind blowing. Pioche, Nev.—Clear, pleasant.

Kaysville.—About 10 inches snow, every appearance of more. Ogden.—Is clearing off fine snow, calm and not very cold.

Corinne.—Cold, strong north wind now flying, had about three inches snow the past three days. Logan.—Cloudy but quite pleasant very little snow now.

Franklin.—Cloudy and cold, snow about two feet deep. A Lamentable Occurrence.—It is with great regret that we learn of the death of Miss Fannie Rogers, daughter of Dr. Russel M. Rogers, which sad event occurred on the 24th inst., at the Rogers farm, near Pleasant Grove. Deceased was an estimable young lady, of an intelligent mind and sweet disposition, beloved and honored by all who knew her.

The following is an extract from a tribute to her memory, which appears in the Enquirer over the signature of Professor Karl G. Maeser, her former teacher, written in behalf of the Faculty and students of the B. Y. Academy:
Especially was her death lamented among her old acquaintances in the B. Y. Academy, where she had been formerly an honored and faithful normal student. Miss Fannie struggled to the end with heroic faith against the grim destroyer, and found her consolation in the administration of the Priesthood, and the prayers of her friends; but it was destined that her pure soul should take her abode among those that have died in the Lord, leaving behind her, however, a spotless record, written with the characters of affection and love in the hearts of those that had the good fortune of her acquaintance. In this Academy her name and example will always be remembered as one worthy of emulation.

Miss Rogers was betrothed in marriage to Mr. J. B. Keeler, the local editor of the Enquirer.

A Lady "Hamlet."—The management of the Theatre have received a communication from Mr. Charles H. Blinn, agent for Miss Nellie Holbrook, an actress who has lately gained great distinction on the Pacific Coast and some of the adjacent islands, in such characters as "Hamlet," "Pauline" in Lady Lyons, "East Lynne," "Lady Macbeth," etc., and who designs visiting the east on a starring tour at an early day. The lady wishes to effect an engagement here, and tarry long enough to play for two or three nights. Possibly some of our readers may remember Miss Holbrook, who visited this city and gave readings several years ago. The writer of the letter says she has lately finished a "month's" tour in Honolulu and throughout Oregon and Nevada, and her golden opinions wherever she has appeared. "Hamlet" is her specialty, she having played it in San Francisco with great success, one night to upwards of \$1,000, and intending to make it one of the chief attractions of her tour in the east.

The management have not yet decided to engage Miss Holbrook, the chief reason being a lack of the necessary support. More will be known shortly.

Disputed Agency.—The agency for Mark Twain's new work, "The Tramp Abroad," is a bone of contention in Utah County, between Mr. R. M. Powers, of this city, who claims the agency for Utah Territory, and Messrs. Johnson and Blanchard, of Springville, who claim the agency for Utah and Juab Counties, the latter derived from the book firm of A. L. Bancroft & Co., San Francisco, which firm asserts its right to the Pacific Slopes, in the interest of said work. A card from Mr. Powers, in the Enquirer of the 21st, asserting that Blanchard had not the shadow of authority to canvass for the book, and stating that he (Blanchard) charged more for the books than was authorized by the publishers, is answered in the same paper of the 25th, by Mr. D. C. Johnson, one of the other party, representing matters as they are, exhibiting their credentials as agents for Bancroft Co., and showing that they are selling the books at the price authorized by the Pacific Slope Company. With these facts verified, the controversy rests with Mr. Powers and Bancroft & Co.

Willard Items.—A correspondent at Willard writes under date of the 25th inst., as follows:
The atmospheric changes of this mountainous region has great in once more a mantle of snow, covering the earth to a depth of about six inches in this neighborhood. 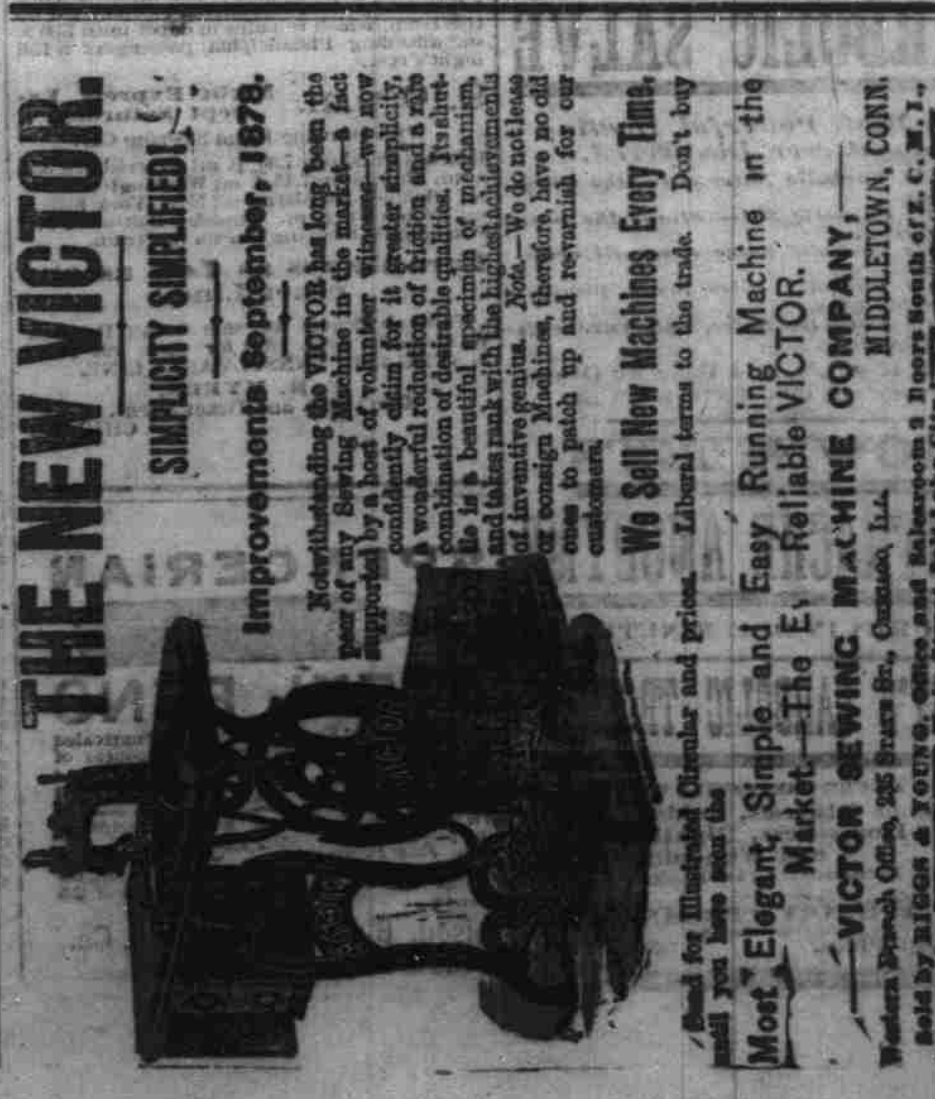
