factures. What has made us great as a nation is protection.

If we take the tariff off wool it will drop in price from fifteen cents, as it is now, to five or six cents. So it is with lead. All our mines would have to close. The great majority of the people of Utah are protectionists whether they are Democrats or Republicans. I believe the Republican party is the one that will make Utah a great State. We invite you to our party, but if you cannot join us be Democrate. But whichever party you join I know you will be true and loyal to the Union of this great country.

The proceedings shortly afterwards terninated.

CITY COUNCIL.

The adjourned session of the City Council was held June 17th. Mayor Scott in the chair. There were present of the old councilmen, Messers. S. A. Wilkins asked for cancellation of sprinkling tax on account of in ability to pay. Committee on sprink-

ling. L. N. Gregor asked to be employed as assistant engineer on sewer pump. Committee on sewerage. Le Grand Young et al. asked for an

extension of watermains on Richards street. Committee on waterworks.

Moylan C. Fox et al. asked to have a sewer pipe laid from Eagle Gate east on South Temple street. Committee on sewerage.

J. L. Doyle et al. asked for the appointment of Frank Kile to position on police force. Referred to the mayor.

The Salt Lake Rapid Transit Street Railway company asked for a franchise to lay a single track on First South from State to Main streets. Committee on streets.

Frank Fitzgerald presented a claim for \$1500 damages alleged to be due by the overflow of water from the city ditch in Parley's canyon on the 8th and 12th inst., and askeu that it be allowed. Committee on claims.

B. Y. Hampton asked that the city engineer be instructed to establish the dividing line between the military reservation and the city. City engineer.

J. A. Morlan et al., asked for an extension of water mains on Sixth East street. Committee on waterworks.

Mount & Griffin asked for an appropriation of \$1000 for street sprinkling. Granted.

H. D. Foleom asked to be allowed to pile huilding material at corner of State and Second South streets; also on South Temple, between First and Second South streets for sixty days. Granted.

William L. Goodsell asked for a position on the police force. Referred to the Mayor.

William Wheeler asked that his sprinkling assessment be rescinded. Committee on sprinkling.

P. L. Squires and others represented that the waste water from the tannery and woollen mills in the Nineteenth ward was allowed to flow into the ditches, and they asked that the prac-tice be stopped. Committee on irrigation.

D. F. Ferry asked that the Salt Lake and Jordan canal be put in proper con-

dition. Committee on canala. W. S. McCornick and 178 others asked that the petition of the Salt Lake City railroad company for a franchise to Capitol bill be granted. Committee on streets.

Schreener Bros. and others asked that First and Wall streets be graded. Committee on streets.

H. D. Folsom asked permission to pile building material on South Temple street, near First West. Granted. Andrew Grondfor and others asked

that the Council investigate the action of the Rio Grande Western in blocking certain streets. Committee on streets.

The motion was put and carried and Recorder Jack read the names of the long outraged but finally triumphant, councilmen. They are as follows: R. W. Young, W. J. Tuddenham, Oscar Hardy, Frank H. Hyde and Eli A Folland. Each of them responded as their names were called and took the seats of which they had so long and illegally been deprived.

J. Fewson Smith Sen., another of the People's councilmen, is atsent from the Territory and his name was not called.

FROM THE OITY ENGINEER.

City Engineer Doremus reported that he had made further examination into the question of constructing a system of waterworks for Capitol hill and the North bench, and recommend-ed that the plan previously submitted be carried out.

Councilman Anderson offered a resolution authorizing the mayor to purchase the pipe and that the treasurer be instructed to advertise for the sale of \$50,000 worth of city bonds to be used for this work only. On motion of Councilman James the

matter went over until the next regular meeting of the Council.

REFERRED FOR HEARING.

City Attorney Hali reported that on account of the rush of business in the Third district court the case involving the condemnation of Second and Third streets from their termini to the reservation, had been referred to W. Van-Cott for hearing. Adopted.

WATER ASSESSMENTS CONFIRMED.

City Recorder Jack reported but one protest against the proposed extension of the water mains along South Temple street. The assessment was confirmed,

The same officer reported that no protests had been filed against the proposed extension of the mains ou Capitol street, S street, Thirteenth East, Ninth East and Fifth South The assessments were constreets. firmed.

SIDEWALK PAVEMENT CONTRACT.

The Board of Public Works reported that they had entered into a contract with Houlahan & Griffith for laying about 80,000 square feet of brick sidewalk pavement on First and Second South streets, between Second and Eighth East; also about 75,000 square Fighth East also about 73,000 square feet of cement sidewalk pavement on South Temple, between East Temple and Third West, and on First South, between Second East and Fourth West streets. Houlalian & Griffith had executed a bond, with W. S. Mc-Cornick and A. Gebbardt as securities in the sum of \$10,000, being 50 per cent. of the estimated coal of the work contracted for.
