Salt Lake Will Get the Advance Next Week.

New York, June 26 .- Lead prices again went up today. The American Smelting and Refining Company advanced prices 1/8 cent per pound. This advance followed a similar one yesterday. The price of the combination now stands at 4% cents. This is an improvement from the bottom price of this year of 1/2 cent, the quotation a short time ago having been fixed at 3% cents, On the 1st of January the price stood at \$3.70

The trade cannot quite understand the motive of the company in advancing prices so radically just now, as trade is dull and even with the production greatly curtailed there will be a surplus stock for a long time to come. Authoritles on lead look for a still further advance in the near future.

Silver today is quoted at 611/2 cents per ounce, as against 61 cents at the lose yesterday and 60% cents earlier in the day. The market is very strong and the prospects are for further advances. demand is largely from Shanghai. although Russia is also believed to be purchasing the metal.

The Japanese government is salso making inquiry for silver in this market for the first time in two or three years. It is not known if these inquiries have been followed by purchases as yet.

IN THE LA SALS.

Rich Gold Float Found-Looking for the Lead.

Grand Valley Times: Mr. John Marin, who is engaged in prospecting in the La Sal district, placed on our desk this week a sample of the gold ore from the Wilson mesa that is attracting so much attention. The free gold can be seen all through it. As yet all the ore that has been found is in large boulders laying on the mesa as float The mesa is a bench of a spur running out from the La Sal peaks and about three miles west from Mill creek and has an elevation of about 9,000 feet. No one can see samples of this ore and ever again doubt the mineral bearing character of the La Sal district. The question now is, where is the great lead this ore came from.

While a number of the La Sal prospectors due to be on their properties in the La Sal this month have not yet arrived, letters from them give the information that the- will be in in force In a few days. On our visit to Mill creek this week we found many of last season's workers driving away on their claims and all showing up most encouraging. Sait Lake parties who were in last week to look over the Thomson Caldwell property were greatly pleased at the showing of mineral in the La Sals generally. They will be back in a short time,
