LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Western Union is giving free service on messages relating to the Russian Jewish refugees' relief fund.

The First Congregational Church of Christendom will hold a social this evening in the church parlors, where a special program relating to missionary work is to be given.

Prof. Lorado Taft, the noted sculptor who lectured in the Y. M. C. A. recently, writes from Chicago to a friend in this city, stating that the report of his lecture as given in the "News" was one of the best he ever had.

The W. C. T. U. ladies will hold their monthly meeting tomorrow at 2:30 p. m., at the residence of Mrs. C. D. Lavery, 140 Tenth East street. This is the last meeting with Mrs. Lavery, as she removes to Tacoma, early in December.

The Utah Indians are creating such a scare in western Colorado, that Gov. McDonald has notified Troop D, of the cavalry squadron of the National Guard to hold itself in readiness for immediate service. If necessary, the other three troops will be called out.

Card invitations are out from the board of trustees of the Congregation B'nai Israel to be present at the celebration in honor of the 50th anniversary of the settlement of the Jews in America, to be held in the temple, Fourth East street, this evening at 8 o'clock.

To accommodate several western states it is found necessary to defer the date of the proposed conference relative to inaugurating the "See America First" project, from Jan. 18, and the special committee of the Commercial club will act on this matter presently.

A new noted painting entitled "Roping a Grizzly," by the cowboy painter Russell, and sold to Senator W. A. Clark for \$10,000, has been lithographed handsomely in color and added to the calendar art world. A prominent local drug company is the first to introduce the same into the Salt Lake field.

The Rocky Mountain lodge No. 3, Knights of Pythias, entertained their friends last night, in Castle hall, with a "63" followed by a program and refreshments. Among the speakers were Dr. C. I. Douglas, Past Grand Chancellor W. R. White and H. P. Johnson. Recitations were given by Mrs. Randolph and John Milton, while Miss Ethel M. Nettleton gave a piano solo.

Mayor Morris died accidentally yesterday afternoon with the state engineer for 30 second feet of water from Big Cottonwood creek, the water to be diverted immediately below the fall race of the Utah power plant. The diverting works consist of a dam across the channel of the creek, with reinforced concrete conduits leading from it. The length of the diverting channel is to be 20,000 feet.
