MURDER IN MONTANA .- The Helens Daily Herald of the 10th inst., contains an account of the shooting of a young man named Charles Perkins, by a private soldier of the 13th infantry named Henry Baldwin, on the afternoon of the Sth inst. It appears that Baldwin lately reached Helena from Fort Shaw, forming one of an escort to the paymaster. On reaching Halena he fell in with the deceased, who escorted him around town, and introduced him to a number of houses of ill fame. At one of these the deceased left Baldwin with one or two other soldiers. In the sfternoon Baldwin returned and stiempted force an entrance into the house. A few moments afterwards the soldier came out of the house from the reat entrance with a loaded revolver in his hand, and im-mediately fired twice at Charley, who, hav-ing been previously warned, was endeavor-ing to make his escape, and had just reaching to make his escape, and had just reach-ed the opposite side of the street, when the third shot was fired, the ball taking affect in the forehead. The wounded man feil back into a shop and expired in half an hour afterwards. A physician was call-ed in, who pronounced the wound mortal, and that medical aid would be of no avail. Baldwin, after the fatal shot had been fired, smeaked back into the vile haunt from which he had just energed, and was soon efterwards arrested and lodged in jail.
