Commercial Treaty.

MADRID, 4 .- It is announced that commercial arrangement will shortly be concluded between/Spain and the United States, by which Spain agrees to apply the so-called 30-column tariff to apply the so-called 30-column tariff to imports from America into Central America and Porto Rico, which is tan-tamount to suppressing the flag and differential duties. Spain also agrees to abrogate the special duties on live fish incubated in fish ponds and import-ed in foreign bottoms, and to suppress consular and tonnage duties on vessels leaving the United States for Cubs or Porto Rico. The United States abolish the 10 per cent. ad valorem duty on imports from Cuba and Porto Rico un-der the Spanish flag. Complete equal-ity of treatment will be established be-tween Cuba and Porto Rico on the other. American custom house offi-cials will furnish Spanish consuls sta-tistics regarding the quantity of sugar and tobacco imported from the An-tilles. The arrangement comes into force March 1st, and will be the preilles.
