

the Tapis. WASHINGTON, Sept. 30 .- When the wo Houses of Congress are called to order at 12 o'clock tomorrow, the session will have become the longest by 24 hours in American history. The 24 hours in American history. The longest preceding session was that of 1850, the year of the Missouri compromise, which was adjourned at noon Sept. 30. Constructively the session of 1868, following the impeachment proceedings against President Johnson, was longer, the adjournment having taken place Nov. 10, but as a matter of fact Congress took a six week's see fact Congress took a six week's rest from July 27th and never afterwards

the general deficiency bill is still before the conferees of the two houses, it cannot yet be said that the year's regular work for either house is finished. The tariff bill will be reported to the Senate Tuesday or Wednesday, and is to be taken up for dehate on Monday of next week. The unfinished business of the Senate is the bill to ferfett the uncarned portion of the Northern Pacific land grant upon which Senator Berry will tomorrow deliver a speech defending the public land record of the democrats, in answer to the speech of Senator Plumb last week. It is expected that Senator Do'ph will also make a speech on the measure. The library award bill is also the special order for tomorrow. Senator Chandler, looking to an investigation of political methods in Louisians, is hiely to furnish a text for further pelitical speaking during the week. The territorial admission bills are recognized as having rights of way. Next to them consideration of the Sherman trust bill is regarded as possible.

The Senate has, however, consistently disregarded all its programmes for several weeks past. Nothing but purely political measures can be held to be probable subjects of debate during the session.

TWO MORE MURDERS. All London Again Aroused Over the Bysterious Crimes.

LONDON, Sept 30 .- This morning the whole city was again startled by the news that two more murders had been added to the list of mysterious crimes that have recently been committed in that have recently been committed in Whitechapel. At an early hour it was known that another woman had been murdered and the report was that there was still another victim. The two victims, as in the former cases, were dissolute women of a poor class. That the motive of the murderer was not robbery is shown by the fact that no attempt was made to dispoil the bodies.

THE PIRST MURDER. occurred in a narrow street at an early hour this morning, beneath the window of the Foreigner's Socialist Club. A cencert was in progress and many members of the club were present, but no sound was heard. The same pro-cess had been followed as in the cess had been followed as in the other cases. The police who have been detailed in connection with the Whitechapel murders are paralyzed by these latest crimes. As soon as the news was received at police headquarters a messenger was dispatched for Sir Charles Warren, Chief Commissioner of Police. He was called out of bed and at once visited the scene of the murders. The inhabitants of Whitechapel are dismayed. Vigitance committees, which were formed after the first crimes were committed, had relaxed their efforts to capture the murderers. At several meetings held in Whitechapel tonight it was resolved to resume the work of patrolling the streets in the district which the murders have occurred.

The Bainer's Street victim was Elizabeth Stride, a native of Stockholm, who resided in a common lodging house. The name of the other victim is not known. The corpses of the murdered Germans were terribly mutilated. An English gunboat saved the lives of Germans at Lindi.

The Germans escaped from Mikindani half an hour before the arrival of the lisurgents, who fired voileys at their dhow, laden with thousands of pounds of gun powder. The entire wealthy community of British Indian subjects at Begomove left that piace today, terror stricken, owing to a rumer that a descent upon the town by natives is immisent.




