Former Dean James B. Eddie of St. Mark's cathedral is due in this city this Mark's cathedral is due in this city this evening, from Los Angeles. The object of his visit is to appear before the local ecclesiastical court of the Episcopal church to hear the findings in the charges of improper conduct that were brought against him two years ago.
