WANTED TO KILL CLEVELAND.

New York, Nov. 20.—Ex-President Cleveland has caused for congratulation today over the fact that John T. Davis, the crack who shot and wounded Mrs. Gladys Price in the Mariner's Church on Madison Street Tuesday night, did not escape after his capture.

He was taken to the police station and is now being held in the city jail.

He is charged with the murder of Mrs. Price, who he claimed sat near him during the services and the sight of whom caused him to attempt the young woman's life at the close of the church service.

Detective Canavan says the man is undoubtedly insane, one subject of his imaginary marriage to Mrs. Price, although he talks rationally enough on other matters.

IN THE SERVICE OF THE CHAIR. Agents Trying to Discover the Secrets of the Poles.

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 20.—Several weeks ago Leo Holopron, a Russian, was a clerk in a building in this city and disappeared, leaving a wife who had arrived from abroad only a short time before. Holopron, it has since been discovered, tried for four years to secure the confidence of Frank Grygla, himself an exiled Polish Count and president of the Polish Alliance in the United States, with regard to the society's secrets and the channels through which the organization has been furnishing aid to the exiles of the nation in Siberia, which Mr. Grygla admits is the avowed object.

Madame Holopron was left in apparently pitiful circumstances, in a strange country and unable to speak a word of English, but did not seem much cut up over her husband's departure and evinced considerable interest by way of questions regarding the Polish alliance as soon as she was well enough to be interviewed by her sister-in-law. This aroused Mr. Grygla's suspicion, and he began to question her as to the nature of her husband's mission. She proved both Holopron and his wife to be in the service of the society, the purpose of discovering and adding the Russian police to the ranks of the Polish citizens in Warsaw who act as the transmitters of the money sent to Siberia from their countrymen in America. Madame Holopron still remains in Minneapolis, while from information gathered by the members of the alliance the male spy is now on his way to Poland, accompanied by the eldest child.

THE CHEROKEE STRIP. It Will Be Stolen Unless Protected by Government.

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 20.—Secretary Blair of the Cherokee Strip Land Office has issued a warning and tells a startling story of the ruin and desolation now in order in the strip. He says that the opinion that within thirty days from now the strip will be vacated by the ranchmen all the improvements made by the Indians and the value of the land will be lost. He says that the government is now endeavoring to protect the property. The value of the improvements is placed at \$500,000.

In the suit of the association against J. H. Barker, one of the leaders of the "Klondike" band, the judge instructed the jury to find for plaintiff, declaring the association's title to the land valid and declaring the Indians owners of the strip. The association will now sue the United States government for damages in a sum aggregating \$1,000,000.
