TRACY THE WINNER.

Automobile Elimination Race Goes to Him—Only Three Finish.

New York, Sept. 23.—A vast throng which rushed upon the course today prevented the completion of the elimination race to select five American racing automobiles to take part in the race for the Vanderbilt cup, after three of the cars had completed the race. Joseph Tracy, who won the race, Herbert Leblond, second, and H. N. Harding, third, were the only racers who were allowed to cover the entire course.

They thus qualified their machines for the cup race and the judges selected machines driven by Herbert L. Lytle and Walter Christie as the other two to represent American manufacturers in the big race.

LEAVENWORTH. Kan., Sept. 23.—The twenty-round fight for the welterweight championship, scheduled to take place in a grove near here this afternoon between Joe Wolcott, the negro champion, and Billy Rhodes, was prevented by the police.

It was intended to hold the fight at a point on the Kansas-Missouri state line, and only the interference of the governor's order prevented it from being pulled off according to schedule. Gov.
