

sulted in the acquittal of Mrs. Perkins and the holding of her husband in \$75 bonds to keep the peace toward Mr. Cederlof for the next six months.

At 5 o'clock this (Monday) morning, Adam Rich, who has been employed for many years as janitor at the Tabernacle, died at his home in the Ninth ward of this city, at the age of 70 years, 7 months and 24 days. He was born in Pottsville, Pennsylvania, December 25, 1825, and came to Utah in 1861. He had been a member of the Church for nearly forty years, was in good standing, and was highly esteemed as a citizen.

The cause of Mr. Rich's death was a practical joke perpetrated by boys in the Ninth ward on Saturday evening. At that time the aged gentleman had occasion to pass along a path through a patch of lucern near his residence. Some neighbor's boys had strung a wire across the path, and not noticing it Mr. Rich was tripped and thrown heavily to the ground. The fall occasioned strangulated hernia, the injury being to his left side, and he was unable to arise. Shortly after the accident his wife discovered him and he was assisted into the house and medical skill summoned.

Efforts were made until yesterday afternoon to give him relief, but all were unavailing. It became apparent that the only hope of saving his life was in having a surgical operation performed, and even this means was considered of doubtful efficiency. It was determined, however, to make every effort that gave any hope of saving him, so the operation was performed at 3 p.m. yesterday by Drs. Richards, Wilcox and Taylor. For a time the patient rallied, and there seemed some hope that he might pull through, notwithstanding his advanced years. This hope, however, did not last long, for he gradually sank until death came.

The deceased leaves a wife, three daughters and a number of grandchildren, who are deeply sympathized with by many friends. One of his daughters resides in Union, Oregon—Mrs. W. H. Leopold. She has been telegraphed to, and the funeral will be deferred to enable her to be present. The other daughters are Mrs. Emma Ryan and Mrs. Hannah A. Ward, of this city.

Following is from our Logan correspondent under date of August 19:

The track of the Logan wheel club was in good condition on Saturday, when eight races were run under the auspices of the L. A. W., C. A. E. as referee and general supervisor. It was expected that a good many crack class B men would compete, but only Thatcher and Weiler represented that class. The races were not well patronized; the principal reason being that price of admission had been raised from 25 to 50 cents. The average Loganite is not willing to pay more than 25 cents to witness any outdoor sport. Following is a summary of the race:

One mile, novice, won by H. Beck, Jacob Rousseau, second. Time, 8:02. As the time limit was three minutes, this race had to be run over. Beck won; Rousseau second. Time, 2:57 1-5.

One mile scratch, class B, won by Frank Thatcher, Geo. Weiler second. Time, 2:26 1-5.

One-half mile scratch, class A,

brought out C. C. Holzal, O. P. Thatcher and Fred H. May to qualify. May and Thatcher qualified. The second heat was contested by A. E. Hyde and Joseph and Hyrum Beck. Hyde and Joseph Beck qualified. The final heat was won by Hyde, in 1:09 1-4, with May second.

The half-mile scratch, class B, between Weiler and Thatcher, was a pretty race, but had to be run over, as it exceeded the 1:15 time limit. In the second heat Thatcher won in just the time limit.

The two mile lap, class B, between Thatcher and Weiler, had no time limit. The winner in each lap scored three and the loser two, except in the final lap, when the winner scored four. The race was made in the final lap, which was won by Weiler. The winner's time for the two miles was 5:39.

One mile lap, class A, for Cache county, boys, was won by L. F. Smith in 2:39, with Orson Thatcher second.

One mile open, class A, contested by Fred H. May, Jos. Beck, A. E. Hyde Jr. and C. C. Holzal. Hyde, May and Holzal were qualified for the final heat, with a time limit of 2:45.

By a desperate effort at the outcome, Hyde won from May, in 2:44 3-5.

A one mile heat for boys brought out Royal C. Bassett and A. P. Stover. Stover won in 3:17.

Mr. C. C. Goodwin, ex-U. S. commissioner, fell from the top to the bottom of the stair case in his house at a late hour on Friday night, while going down to let in his son, who had just arrived from the family ranch. A broken shoulderblade, several fractured ribs and a scalp wound were the results of the fall. Dr. Parkinson attended his injuries.

Andrew Ellason's horses took fright the other evening while he was unhitching them after a drive, and ran over him. No bones were broken but bruises were plentiful, and large.

A party of Indians arrived in town early in the week, bringing a sick companion from the Washakie Indian farm. It developed that he was suffering from typhoid pneumonia. He was given the best medical attendance, but died at about one o'clock Thursday morning, to the great sorrow of his companions, whose lamentations woke many people up.

COUNTY SCHOOL POPULATION, 6,391.

Superintendent of Salt Lake County Schools D. R. Allen, has finished compiling the school census returns as made by the enumerators. The net increase for the year is 126, of which 72 are of Mormon and 54 of non-Mormon parentage. All the school children are, of course, between the ages of 16 and 18 years. The returns show all of them in the county to be white with the exception of two Indian pupils in Sugar House Ward. Farmers Ward made the heaviest increase—64 during the year. Herriman shows a decrease of ten and Brigham of two. The compilation is as follows:
