For a time the pati nt rilled, and there seemed some hope that he might pulthrough, notwithstanding his vauced years. This hope, however, did not last long; for he gradually sans until deatu came.

The deceased leaves a wife, three daughters and a number of grandchildren, who are deeply sympathized wit by many iriends. One of his daughters resides in Union, Oregon-Mrs. W. H. Leopoid. She has been telegraphed to, and the funeral will be deferred to enable her to be present. The other daughters are Mrs. Emma Ryan and Mrs. Hannah A. Ward, of this city.
